## UTME 2019: ABUJA COURT CONVICTS 'PROFESSOR' FOR IMPERSONATION

A Chief Magistrate Court in Wuse Zone 2, Abuja, has sentenced 'Professor' Jide Josiah Jisos to six months in prison for impersonation during the 2019 Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME).

It was reported that 'Prof.' Jisos was apprehended by officials of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) while monitoring the 2019 UTME at Brix Academy in Abuja.

Jisos had presented himself to JAMB

examination officials as a representative of a non-governmental organization (NGO), claiming he was there to oversee the examination. However, his deception was uncovered when he was questioned by the leader of the monitoring team in the examination hall, who asked him to clarify his purpose.

Unable to substantiate his claims, Jisos was arrested and handed over to security personnel for further investigation. During interrogation, he

In a significant effort to enhance workplace efficiency and productivity, the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has secured approval from relevant authorities to introduce improved

retirement benefits and housing schemes for its staff.

At an emergency meeting on Thursday, October 31, 2024, Registrar Prof. Is-haq Oloyede shared this exciting development with the staff, who welcomed the news with enthusiasm.

The Registrar announced a new partnership with the Federal Housing Authority, allowing staff to access affordable housing while still in service. This initiative aims to ensure that employees have secure housing upon retirement. Under this package, the Board will provide a complementary exit package ranging from three million to ten million naira, depending on the staff

The National Universities Commission (NUC) and the Commonwealth of Learning (COL), Canada, have collaborated in a bid to tackle the challenges of graduate employability and entrepreneurial skills development in Nigeria.

Acting Executive Secretary, NUC, Mr. Chris Maiyaki while speaking at a three-day Stakeholders Capacity Workshop in Abuja, lamented the high rate of graduate unemployment in the country and called on stakeholders to find solutions to these issues.

Mr. Maiyaki explained that the workshop focused on developing and implementing a national framework and strategies to enhance graduate employability in Nigeria's higher education sector...

Also speaking, Higher Education Adviser at COL, Prof. Jane-Frances Agbu, stated that the increasing complexities in the world of work, particularly the issue of skill mismatches. She noted that the world is evolving, adding that companies need employees who can adapt to evolving challenges.

The Lagos State Commissioner for Tertiary Education, Tolani Sule, has announced that the State Executive Council has approved the upgrade of Lagos State University College of Medicine to a specialised medical university, to be named the University of Medicine and Health Sciences.

He disclosed this recently at the Conference Hall, TETFund building, LASUCOM premises, during a stakeholders' meeting jointly organised by the Ministry of Tertiary Education and Ministry of Health with the management teams of LASUCOM and Lagos State University Teaching Hospital in attendance.

Mr. Sule revealed that the draft law to establish the university had been approved for submission to the Lagos State House of Assembly. He noted that the university would function with a network of clinical training facilities across the IBILE Administrative divisions of the state, with LASUTH serving as the primary oversight clinical training facility...

The Provost of LASUCOM, Prof Abiodun Adewuya, expressed his gratitude to the state government and emphasised the college's readiness to support the transition to the University of Medicine and Health Science.

## CANDIDATES ENTHUSIASTIC OF CONTACTLESS REGIME – ADEBIYI

The Gombe State Coordinator, Mr. Johnson Adebisi, has submitted that candidates are enthusiastic of the soon-to-be-unveiled contactless service regime.

The Coordinator made the submission in his office on Thursday, 24th October, 2024, while presenting the research report where candidates' perceptions were sought with respect to the initiative.

While presenting the report to the members of staff of the State Office, Adebisi disclosed that a survey to identify the needs, preferences, behaviours, and motivations of the candidates was conducted with the aim of gathering in-depth information on the anticipated service regime.

The Coordinator noted that the upsurge in the demand for the services of the Board and the change in its modus operandi made it imperative for the Board to conduct the research so as to gather relevant information, explore various perspectives, and propose well-informed solutions. He added that the ability to approach challenges

with a research-oriented mindset would enhance problem-solving capabilities that would cumulate into efficient outcome.

Adebisi explained further that the investigation was envisioned to foster the Board's culture of putting candidates first in its activities towards enhancing customers' satisfaction in service delivery.

According to him, the study adopted summative scale and interview as instruments for data collection while the findings revealed candidates' views on the online interactive regime as of the time of the study.

In his analysis, 100% of the sample population strongly agreed with the online service regime and were of the opinion that the contactless service regime would eliminate unwholesome practices. In addition, the respondents unanimously agreed that online interaction would enhance the Board's service delivery and reduce transportation costs for the candidates.

On their preferred communication channels with the Board, Adebisi

stated that 58.6% of the respondents preferred e-mail, while 28.9% and 12.5% indicated preference for telephone and ticketing respectively.

During the interview session, all the respondents urged the Board to add Whatsapp Messenger to the Board's communication channels noting that such is in line with global best practices.

Adebisi revealed that this preference for a Whatsapp interactive platform by candidates informed the decision of the State Office to set up a committee to come up with the modalities for setting up an Artificial Intelligence (AI) inspired called Chatbots. He explained that the use of Chatbots as conversational tools would help in managing routine tasks efficiently and provide instantaneous feedback to candidate.

In the same vein, the Coordinator submitted that the State Office would sustain a hybrid work environment to ensure meaningful interaction with candidates on a twenty-four hours basis including weekends.

In response, Prof. Oloyede praised NISS for its professionalism and

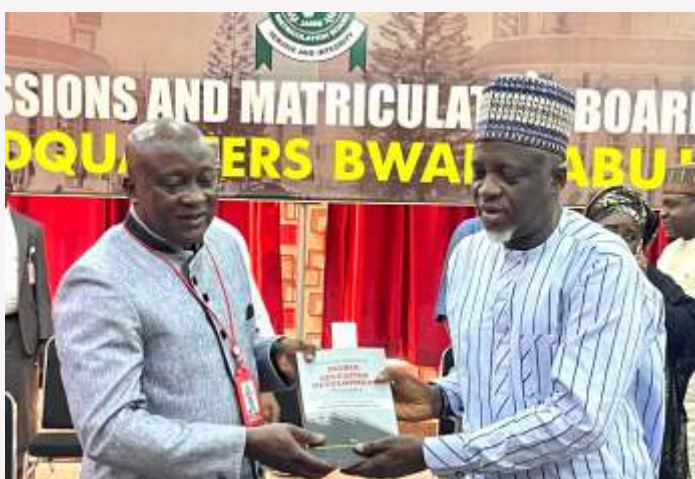

member's rank and cadre. This support is designed to alleviate the financial burden of housing costs through the partnership with FHA, making it more feasible for staff to secure homes, as many may struggle to afford housing solely based on their salaries.

However, the Registrar noted that two categories of staff would be excluded from this initiative: those currently holding loans with the National Housing Fund (NHF) and those who have accessed 25% of their contributory pension scheme

for mortgage purposes.

To sustain this initiative, the Board has committed to allocating one billion naira annually.

Prof. Oloyede urged staff to act as responsible ambassadors of the Board and to avoid any actions that could jeopardize this generous welfare program and their careers. He emphasized, "If the system is doing so much for you, it is imperative that you refrain from any

The Chairperson of the Forum, the Director, Abuja Zonal Office, Mrs. Zainab Hamza, had during a virtual meeting held with the members of the Forum on Monday, 28th October, 2024, stated that the initiative was designed to monitor and optimise the operations of the Board's registration and testing centres, as well as provide real-time data of the current state of the facilities at each

of these centres to enable all Zonal Directors/Coordinators take adequate measures towards addressing emerging issues, particularly, those that are technically related.

### **MANDATORY USE OF THE NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (NIN) FOR REGISTRATION WITH JAMB BY CANDIDATES APPLYING FOR NON-REGULAR PROGRAMMES**

**This Advisory is issued to all the concerned institutions, and candidates desirous of applying to study under the non-regular mode of study in tertiary institutions in Nigeria.**

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular**.

2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.

### RE: CONDONMENT OF ILLEGAL ADMISSIONS BY JAMB

This is a reminder regarding Circular No. JAMB/ADMS/DO/192/V.I, dated July 31, 2024, which addressed the termination of the condonement process for illegal admissions without registration numbers. In that circular, the Board requested that institutions declare such candidates by August 31, 2024. This marked the first phase of the exercise, and a subsequent deadline for registration and completion of the condonement process will be announced.

2. The second phase of the exercise, which pertains to the condonement of illegal admissions for candidates with registration numbers has now commenced. The Board has the necessary details and records for these candidates from earlier registrations.

3. By this development, **institutions are hereby required to now (or never) disclose, through the CAPS mail:**

- i. All candidates who were admitted illegally before 2017, that have JAMB registration numbers and whose records are on their system, within the next one (1) month beginning from 1<sup>st</sup> of September 2024.
- ii. All candidates who fall within the 2017-2020 window for the Condonment of Undisclosed Illegal Institutional Admissions (CUIIA) that have JAMB registration numbers and had not been included in the earlier declaration made by the institution. This is to be done within the next one (1) month beginning from 1<sup>st</sup> of September 2024.

4. The dateline for all these disclosures will be 30<sup>th</sup> of September 2024 after which no declaration will be entertained.

5. The Board would like to emphasize that any admissions granted during the specified periods (pre-2017 and 2017-2020) will no longer be recognized or condoned unless disclosed within this one-month window. Only students listed in the declared submissions will be permitted to register with the Board. A deadline for the completion of all condonement processes will be established.

6. These measures are implemented to address previously abused admission windows while reaffirming that CAPS remains the sole authorized platform for admissions. Institutions are strongly advised to adhere to these guidelines.

### MINISTERIAL DIRECTIVES ON THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE INTER-MINISTERIAL INVESTIGATIVE COMMITTEE ON DEGREE CERTIFICATE MILLING: REQUEST FOR IMPLEMENTATION

You are aware that the Federal Government through an inter-ministerial committee had investigated the issues of certificate racketeering involving some foreign institutions around Nigeria. The investigations also looked at the issue of illegal admissions by institutions in Nigeria and the issuance of fake certificates by the institutions. The Hon. Minister of Education has now directed the implementation of the recommendations contained in the report of the investigation committee.

2. I therefore convey the directives of the Honourable Minister to the Board for implementation of the following recommendations (a copy of the letter from the Hon. Minister is attached):

- i. Enforce the mandatory requirement for all tertiary institutions in Nigeria to exclusively conduct their admissions processes through the Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS) under the auspices of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
- ii. Mandate all tertiary institutions in Nigeria to regularly submit their matriculation lists to the Federal Ministry of Education not later than three months after matriculation ceremonies through the dedicated channel of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).

3. Consequently, the Board reiterates the Policy that under no condition shall any candidate be admitted outside CAPS. Furthermore, the recent circular No. JAMB/ADMS/DO/192/V.I dated 31<sup>st</sup> July 2024 by the Board, emphasizes that no illegal admission will henceforth be condoned and any institution found to have admitted any candidate outside CAPS will be made to face appropriate sanctions. This is in addition to the forfeiture of the said admission with its legal implications.

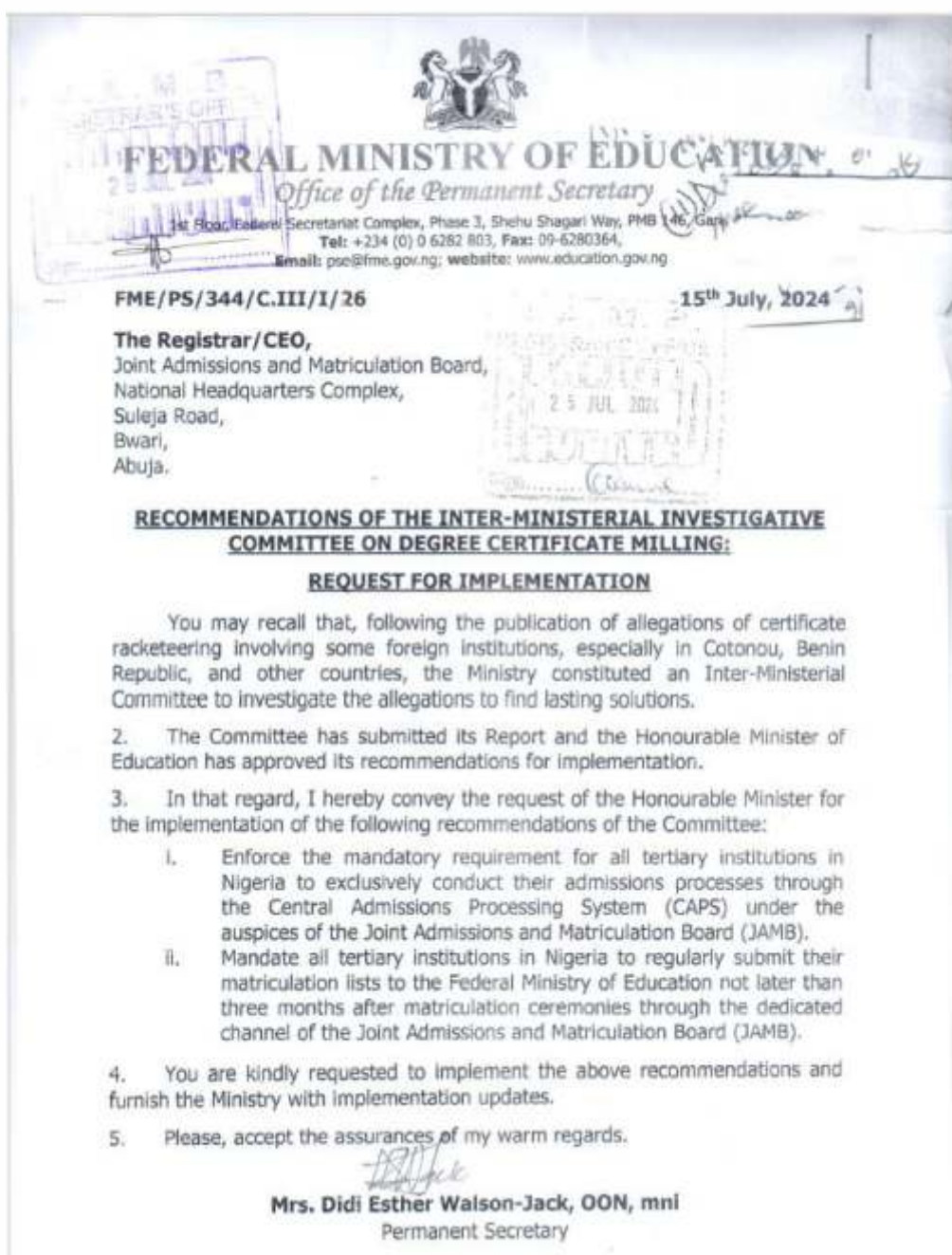

### ADMISSION OF CANDIDATES WITH MINIMUM ADMISSIBLE AGE OF 16 YEARS

Recall that the issue of the minimum age for admission in the nation's tertiary institutions was deliberated and decided at the 2024 Policy Meeting to be 16 years old for the 2024/25 academic session. Subsequently, the cut-off date was put on the 31st of December 2024.

2. The Board has taken cognizance that, due to different reasons, some institutions expect the 2024/2025 admission to run through July 2025. Without compromising the standard or infringing on the individual institution's admission policy, the Board has now decided to allow any willing institution to admit candidates who will be 16 years old by the 31st of August 2025, so long as the standards set by the institution qualify such candidate but couldn't be admitted only because of age.

3. This is without prejudice to the decision of any institution that might have on its own, decided on the minimum age of not less than 16 years which remains sacrosanct.

4. By this development, you are requested to harvest from your CAPS and send the list of candidates who would be 16 years of age between 1st of January and 31st of August 2025 who are eligible for admission (if any), not later than a week from the date on this letter to enable final decision.

#### NOTE:


- i. This effort is to ensure equity because those whose 2024 admission would last till August 2025 would not be unduly favoured.
- ii. Any institution that insists on its 16 years being within the year 2024 is completely free to do so.

## CESSATION OF ILLEGAL/IRREGULAR ADMISSIONS


 All applications of admissions to **First Degree, National Diploma, National Innovation Diploma and the Nigeria Certificate in Education into Full-Time, Distance Learning, Part-Time, Outreach, Sandwich, etc.**, must be processed **ONLY** through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).


 No Institution should advertise or sell “application forms” for admissions into the programmes. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.

 Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and the three (3) Regulatory Agencies (National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) will ensure that all Tertiary Institutions comply with this policy directive. Other Professional Regulatory Agencies will also play a role in sanitizing the process.

 The duration of all Non-Full Time Studies must be maintained as approved by the Regulatory Agencies. This is generally not less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the equivalence of Full Time.

### ADVERTORIALS

 Institutions that desire to place advertisement can do so with the requirement that candidates who sat for the current **UTME** (or **DE** candidates) should change to their institutions as First (1st) Choice rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application form or apply. This is to prevent the issue of double registration which is a violation of the mandate of JAMB.

 It should be reiterated that no Institution should advertise or sell “application forms” for admissions into the programmes listed above. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
