he Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has officially commenced the accreditation of centres for the 2025 Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME). This accreditation process is a critical first step in preparation for the annual examination. All new Computer-Based Test (CBT) centres who desire to participate in the 2025 UTME exercise are to first visit

https://www.jamb.gov.ng/Pdfs/CBT_cen tre_requirements.pdf to avail themselves of the requirements for establishing a JAMB-approved CBT centre.

This exercise is designed to ensure that only credible centres are approved and utilized for the examination, thereby sustaining the integrity of the annual assessment. Following this, these centres should notify the Board in writing of their intention to participate in the

he Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has once again received accolades for its significant contributions to the education sector, particularly for its commitment to transparent admissions processes.

Prof. Is-haq Oloyede and his management team were praised for their meticulous approach in executing credible admissions through the Central Admission Processing System (CAPS), which has been in place for nearly seven years. During the 14th matriculation ceremony at the Federal University,

Oye-Ekiti (FUOYE) on November 14, 2024, Vice Chancellor Prof. Abayomi Fasina highlighted CAPS as a legitimate avenue for processing admissions into higher education institutions in Nigeria, stating that it has reinvigorated confidence in the system.

Prof. Fasina announced that over 8,000 new students were admitted to various programs for the 2024/2025 academic session, emphasizing that these admissions adhered strictly to established auidelines via CAPS.

He further noted that FUOYE is rapidly emerging as a leading

institution in the country, having received approximately 64,000 applications during the recent admission cycle, making it the thirdmost subscribed university in Nigeria. In a statement made during the ceremony, Mr. Hassan Lawal, the JAMB Ekiti State Coordinator who represented the Registrar, cautioned against any attempts to engage in backdoor admissions. He reiterated that JAMB would not condone any actions that violate legal provisions and emphasized that institutions adhering to proper admission protocols would be recognized with the NATAP-M Award.

olicy makers in Nigeria have been urged to reduce the country's overreliance on oil by exploring credible alternatives, such as agriculture and other sectors. VANGUARD, TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 12. 2024: Why Some 2024 NECO, WAEC Candidates May Not Gain Admission- NSSEC: - The Executive Secretary of the National Senior Secondary Education Commission (NSSEC), Dr. Iyela Ajayi, has said 40 per cent of the 2024 National Examination Council (NECO) candidates may not proceed to tertiary institutions for no credit in mathematics and English language. Dr. Ajayi said this recently in Calabar during his address at a five-day capacity-building workshop for selected English language and mathematics teachers within the South-South Geo-Political Zone.

The Executive Secretary said the 2024 NECO result showed that about 61 per cent of the candidates had five credits or above, including mathematics and English language, while about 40 per cent could not credit both core subjects. He urged the teachers from the geopolitical zone to take the training seriously and step it down to other teachers who did not participate in the programme.

The Council, under the leadership of Senator Victor Ndoma-Egba, said, "The Council will not tolerate any unethical conduct in the university" and urged the university to quickly process the remaining cases of misconduct pending, especially the one in the Faculty of Sciences trending in the media, while cautioning staff members and lecturers against all forms of molestation of students.

accreditation exercise. This notification should be addressed to the Registrar of JAMB through the **Zonal Director or State Coordinator** in their respective states.

Established centres that were successfully accredited and participated in the 2024 UTME without any issues should proceed to register their interest through the Centre Management System (CMS) Portal.

The Zonal and State Offices will create accounts for new centres on

the CMS Portal to facilitate their the physical accreditation exercise, registration. All centres must conduct an Autobot/Autotest on a date that will be communicated to them, as part of their preparation for the physical accreditation visit by the Board's team. It is essential to note that the Autobot/Autotest is mandatory; only centres that successfully complete this test and meet the necessary criteria will be eligible for a physical visit.

Only centres that qualify will receive information regarding the date for scheduled for December 2024. Centres that do not achieve satisfactory results on the Autobot/Autotest will not be revisited.

Centres that meet all stipulated requirements will be approved and included by the Board for the 2025 UTME registration and examination.

JAMB SERVICOM CELEBRATES CUSTOMER SERVICE WEEK, ADVOCATES IN SECONDARY SCHOOLS

n celebration of the second edition of the JAMB Customer Service Week, the JAMB NHQ SERVICOM Unit has expressed gratitude to candidates, stakeholders, and dedicated staff members for their significant contributions to effective service delivery.

To further this initiative, the Unit has launched a nationwide sensitization campaign aimed at informing prospective 2025 UTME candidates about the registration process and helping them avoid errors that could impact their future.

This year's event coincided with the symbolic birthday of the Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, and was celebrated globally from October 2 to 6, 2024. Due to other commitments, JAMB designated November 11 to 13, 2024, for the celebration, showcasing various landmark achievements of the SERVICOM Unit over the years.

The sensitization campaian was conducted across all JAMB state and zonal offices during the threeday event.

During visits to selected schools in Bwari and the FCT Area Councils, JAMB Nodal Officer Mrs. Ngozi Egbuna guided attendees through the necessary procedures for the upcoming 2025 UTME registration. She explained that candidates must

first generate a profile code via

55019 or 66019. Once generated, the candidates' biodata will be retrieved from the National Identity Management Commission (NIMC) portal, making the code a unique and irreversible identity on the JAMB

Mrs. Egbuna also emphasized that after successfully generating a profile code, candidates should visit any JAMB-approved Computer-Based Test (CBT) center to purchase an e-PIN for registration.

She urged candidates to make any necessary corrections with NIMC well in advance and ensure all changes are accurately reflected before the registration process, as any discrepancies in biodata cannot be amended post-registration.

Furthermore, Mrs. Egbuna advised candidates to ensure that their NIMC details match those provided to JAMB and reflected in their O' level results, noting that inconsistencies could hinder their mobilization for the mandatory one-year national youth service.

In her concluding remarks, she cautioned candidates against applying substances like abrasives or henna (known as "Laale") on their fingers, as this may distort their fingerprints and complicate biometric verification during registration. She encouraged all staff members to continue supporting candidates beyond the registration

period, aligning with this year's theme: "Above and Beyond."

Among the secondary schools visited in Abuja during the campaign were: Federal Government Girls College, Bwari; Excellence Kiddies Montessori Academy; Government Day Secondary School; De-Gopherwood Montessori School: Government Secondary School (Black and White), Kubwa; Metro International School, Dutse; Total Child Model School, Dutse; Government Girls Secondary School, Dutse; and Government Technical College, Bwari.

In a related effort, the JAMB SERVICOM Ilorin NHQ Annex Office visited six selected senior secondary schools in Kwara State, including Al Mowrid Senior Secondary School, Taoheed Senior Secondary School, Royal Crescent Group of Schools, Kulende Senior Secondary School, C&S Secondary School, and His Grace Secondary School.

School staff expressed gratitude to JAMB for the sensitization efforts and interactions with students. One teacher suggested creating an algorithm to automatically fill UTME subject combinations based on course selections during registration to prevent errors.

MANDATORY USE OF THE NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (NIN) FOR REGISTRATION WITH JAMB BY CANDIDATES APPLYING FOR NON-REGULAR PROGRAMMES

This Advisory is issued to all the concerned institutions, and candidates desirous of applying to study under the non-regular mode of study in tertiary institutions in Nigeria.

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular.**

- 2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
- 3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
- 4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
- 5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
- 6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.
- 7. Please be guided for compliance.

The Vice Chancellor/Rector/Provost,

RE: CONDONMENT OF ILLEGAL ADMISSIONS BY JAMB

This is a reminder regarding Circular No. JAMB/ADMS/DO/192/V.I, dated July 31, 2024, which addressed the termination of the condonement process for illegal admissions without registration numbers. In that circular, the Board requested that institutions declare such candidates by August 31, 2024. This marked the first phase of the exercise, and a subsequent deadline for registration and completion of the condonement process will be announced.

- 2. The second phase of the exercise, which pertains to the condonement of illegal admissions for candidates with registration numbers has now commenced. The Board has the necessary details and records for these candidates from earlier registrations.
- 3. By this development, institutions are hereby required to now (or never) disclose, through the CAPS mail:
 - i. All candidates who were admitted illegally before 2017, that have JAMB registration numbers and whose records are on their system, within the next one (1) month beginning from 1st of September 2024.
 - ii. All candidates who fall within the 2017-2020 window for the Condonment of Undisclosed Illegal Institutional Admissions (CUIIA) that have JAMB registration numbers and had not been included in the earlier declaration made by the institution. This is to be done within the next one (1) month beginning from 1st of September 2024.
- 4. The dateline for all these disclosures will be 30th of September 2024 after which no declaration will be entertained.
- 5. The Board would like to emphasize that any admissions granted during the specified periods (pre-2017 and 2017-2020) will no longer be recognized or condoned unless disclosed within this one-month window. Only students listed in the declared submissions will be permitted to register with the Board. A deadline for the completion of all condonement processes will be established.

- 6. These measures are implemented to address previously abused admission windows while reaffirming that CAPS remains the sole authorized platform for admissions. Institutions are strongly advised to adhere to these guidelines.
- 7. While urging you to accord this circular the attention it deserves, accept the best regards of the Board, please.


MINISTERIAL DIRECTIVES ON THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE INTER-MINISTERIAL INVESTIGATIVE COMMITTEE ON DEGREE CERTIFICATE MILLING: REQUEST FOR IMPLEMENTATION

You are aware that the Federal Government through an inter-ministerial committee had investigated the issues of certificate racketeering involving some foreign institutions around Nigeria. The investigations also looked at the issue of illegal admissions by institutions in Nigeria and the issuance of fake certificates by the institutions. The Hon. Minister of Education has now directed the implementation of the recommendations contained in the report of the investigation committee.

- 2. I therefore convey the directives of the Honourable Minister to the Board for implementation of the following recommendations (a copy of the letter from the Hon. Minister is attached):
 - i. Enforce the mandatory requirement for all tertiary institutions in Nigeria to exclusively conduct their admissions processes through the Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS) under the auspices of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
 - ii. Mandate all tertiary institutions in Nigeria to regularly submit their matriculation lists to the Federal Ministry of Education not later than three months after matriculation ceremonies through the dedicated channel of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
- 3. Consequently, the Board reiterates the Policy that under no condition shall any candidate be admitted outside CAPS. Furthermore, the recent circular No. JAMB/ADMS/DO/192/V.I dated 31st July 2024 by the Board, emphasizes that no illegal admission will henceforth be condoned and any institution found to have admitted any candidate outside CAPS will be made to face appropriate sanctions. This is in addition to the forfeiture of the said admission with its legal implications.

- Each Institution is expected to promptly respond to JAMB analysis of its matriculation 4. list so that the list and the responses could be forwarded, as directed, to the Honourable Minister of Education.
- To further discuss this matter, the Board is arranging a virtual meeting involving all the institutions and the officials of JAMB. The details will be communicated to you.

ADMISSION OF CANDIDATES WITH MINIMUM ADMISSIBLE AGE OF 16 YEARS

Recall that the issue of the minimum age for admission in the nation's tertiary institutions was deliberated and decided at the 2024 Policy Meeting to be 16 years old for the 2024/25 academic session. Subsequently, the cut-off date was put on the 31st of December 2024.

- 2. The Board has taken cognizance that, due to different reasons, some institutions expect the 2024/2025 admission to run through July 2025. Without compromising the standard or infringing on the individual institution's admission policy, the Board has now decided to allow any willing institution to admit candidates who will be 16 years old by the 31st of August 2025, so long as the standards set by the institution qualify such candidate but couldn't be admitted only because of age.
- 3. This is without prejudice to the decision of any institution that might have on its own, decided on the minimum age of not less than 16 years which remains sacrosanct.
- 4. By this development, you are requested to harvest from your CAPS and send the list of candidates who would be 16 years of age between 1st of January and 31st of August 2025 who are eligible for admission (if any), not later than a week from the date on this letter to enable final decision.

NOTE:

- i. This effort is to ensure equity because those whose 2024 admission would last till August 2025 would not be unduly favoured.
- ii. Any institution that insists on its 16 years being within the year 2024 is completely free to do so.

CESSATION OF ILLEGAL/IRREGULAR ADMISSIONS

- All applications of admissions to First Degree, National Diploma, National Innovation Diploma and the Nigeria Certificate in Education into Full-Time, Distance Learning, Part-Time, Outreach, Sandwich, etc., must be processed ONLY through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
- No Institution should advertise or sell "application forms" for admissions into the programmes. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
- Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and the three (3) Regulatory Agencies (National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) will ensure that all Tertiary Institutions comply with this policy directive. Other Professional Regulatory Agencies will also play a role in sanitizing the process.
- The duration of all Non-Full Time Studies must be maintained as approved by the Regulatory Agencies. This is generally not less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the equivalence of Full Time.

<u>ADVERTORIALS</u>

- Institutions that desire to place advertisement can do so with the requirement that candidates who sat for the current **UTME** (or **DE** candidates) should change to their institutions as First (1st) Choice rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application form or apply. This is to prevent the issue of double registration which is a violation of the mandate of JAMB.
- It should be reiterated that no Institution should advertise or sell "application forms" for admissions into the programmes listed above. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
