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2024 POLICY MEETING ON ADMISSIONS SCHEDULED FOR JULY 18TH



The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has fixed Thursday, 18th July 2024 for the Policy Meeting on Admissions into tertiary institutions in Nigeria.

The meeting, which is to be chaired by the Hon. Minister of Education, Prof. Tahir Mamman, would have other critical stakeholders in the education sector in

attendance.

These critical stakeholders include Heads of regulatory agencies such as the National University Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE), National Council for Colleges of Education (NCCE), Heads of tertiary institutions in the country, and the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC), among others.

The policy meeting on admissions sets the tone for any particular year's admission exercise, formulation of admission guidelines. It also presents application statistics, candidates' performance evaluation, as well as setting the acceptable minimum admissions standards for all tertiary

the Board, Stephen Olusola, tied the knot with his heartthrob, former Miss Oladayo Grace.

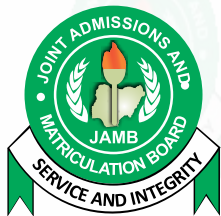

NATION, SUNDAY, JUNE 16, 2024:
WAEC Introduces CBT Option in November WASSCE: - The West African Examinations Council (WAEC) has announced that candidates sitting for the November West African Senior School Certificate Examination (WASSCE) will have the option to choose between Computer-Based Tests (CBT) and Paper-Based Tests. This was revealed by Dr Amos Dangut, Head of the council's National Office in Nigeria while monitoring the ongoing WASSCE in Ibadan.

PUNCH, SUNDAY, JUNE 16, 2024:
Don't Lift the Ban on Togo, Benin Republic Certificates – NANS: - The National Association of Nigerian Students (NANS) has urged the Federal Government to maintain its ban on certificates from universities in Togo and the Republic of Benin, warning against succumbing to pressure to reverse the decision. In a statement signed by its National Senate Clerk, Abdul-Yekinn Odunayo, NANS emphasized that lifting the ban would undermine Nigeria's commitment to quality education and spell doom for the nation. The students' group argued that Nigeria, as a leader in African education, must not accept substandard certificates from unverified institutions. Instead, they appealed to the President Bola Tinubu-led administration to invest in adequate funding and infrastructure for the nation's tertiary institutions, upholding the suspension of certificates from Togo and the Republic of Benin.

He promised that the institution would equip the students to become nationally and internationally relevant by the end of their studies.

VANGUARD, THURSDAY, JUNE 20, 2024: HND Holders to be Employed as Lecturers- NBTE: - The National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) has announced a significant change in the employment of lecturers in polytechnics. According to Executive Secretary Prof. Idris Mohammed Bugaje, holders of Higher National

Diplomas (HND) will now be eligible for lecturer positions under the new schemes of service. This change abolishes the previous Instructor cadre, which had segregated HND holders. The new schemes, approved by Head of Service Dr Mrs Folasade Yemi-Esan, took effect on June 7, 2024, and provide a unified approach to staff recruitment and promotion across all Nigerian polytechnics, including federal, state, and private institutions. Also, inThisDay, Thursday, June 20, 2024.

NATION, THURSDAY, JUNE 20, 2024: WAEC to Gradually Eliminate Use of Papers in Examinations – Official: - The West African Examination Council (WAEC) in Nigeria has announced plans to phase out the use of paper in its examinations, transitioning to electronic devices for the conduct of the West African Senior Secondary School Certificate Examination (WASSCE). Dr. Amos Dangut, Head of National Office, revealed this while monitoring the ongoing WASSCE in Abeokuta, accompanied by Ogun Ministry of Education Permanent Secretary, Mrs. Mariam Oloko. The electronic devices will be deployed to recognized examination centres, eliminating paper registration and detecting malpractice. According to Dr. Dangut, schools with computer-based testing capabilities will

conduct exams on computers, while others will use pen and paper until they are ready. A timeline for the rollout will be established in consultation with the Ministry of Education.

DAILY POST, FRIDAY, JUNE 21, 2024: HoS Yemi-Esan Addresses Controversy Over HND, B.Sc Dichotomy in Civil Service: - The Head of Service of the Federation, HoSF, Dr. Folasade Yemi-Esan, has spoken about the lingering controversy surrounding HND and B.Sc graduates' dichotomy. She pointed out that the curriculum for HND and B.Sc is not the same. Dr. Yemi-Esan was responding to enquiries by a level 14 civil servant, Mr. Ayodele Hassan, when she offered the explanation. According to her, "HND graduates will have to undergo mandatory one year training before conversion from Executive to Officer cadre." The HoS said this when she met (virtually) with civil servants as part of events lined up to celebrate the 2024 Civil Service Week with the theme 'Educate an African fit for the 21st Century: Building Resilient Education Systems for Increased Access to Inclusive, Lifelong, Quality and Relevant Learning', held in Abuja.

During the exercise, the Registrar will present reports on the just-concluded Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) and the ongoing Direct Entry (DE) applications while also analysing key performance indicators that could shape the policy directions of the government in the area of admission.

Also, the meeting would apprise

stakeholders of the salient issues that cropped up in the course of the previous year's admission exercise. In addition, the policy meeting would look at the performance of candidates in the current year's UTME in order to determine the year's minimum admissible score.

It would be recalled that stakeholders had in the previous year agreed on the minimum admission requirement for admission into universities, polytechnics and

colleges of education.

Furthermore, the meeting would determine the year's admission requirements while kick-starting the admission process for the current year; discuss unresolved issues emanating from the previous academic year; and, at the same time, appraise the compliance of stakeholders with extant advisories and suggesting further amendments where necessary.

Linguists study various aspects of language, including its sounds (phonetics and phonology), structure (syntax and morphology), meaning (semantics), and context of use (pragmatics). Linguistics graduates have a diverse range of career options beyond traditional academia including playing such roles as speech therapists, editors, copywriters and content creators, publishers, cross-cultural communication consultants, language instructors and translators,

analysts in technology, media, education, government, business and healthcare.

With their analytical skills and understanding of language structure, they can thrive in various industries where communication and languages play crucial roles. It is a four-year course under the Faculty of Arts and Humanities.

UTME subjects required are: Use of English, any language and 2 Arts/Social Science subjects.

For special waivers from institutions, check the brochure on www.ibass.jamb.gov.ng. O'level requirements are: a credit pass in English Language, Mathematics, Yoruba/Igbo/Hausa and any two subjects. For special waivers from

Institutions offering linguistics cut across public, state and private universities among which are: University of Nigeria, Nsukka; University of Abuja; Bayero University, Kano; Olabisi Onabanjo University, Ago-Iwoye; Delta State University, University of Ilorin, etc.

RE: ADVISORY ON 2024 DIRECT ENTRY (DE) REGISTRATION, VERIFICATION AND ALIGNMENT OF DATA (VERIFICATION OF A-LEVEL QUALIFICATIONS BY AWARDING INSTITUTIONS)

This advisory is issued to guide all A-level certificate awarding institutions on the procedures of verifying the certificates claimed by candidates during the 2024 DE registration exercise.

This is a follow-up to the earlier issued advisory referenced No. 2024ff01, dated 31st March, 2024 (copy attached) on the above subject. This edition is issued to reiterate the previously raised matters as well as to guide all A-level awarding institutions on the procedures to be followed to verify the certificates claimed by candidates during the 2024 DE registration exercise.

All concerned institutions should therefore take note and adhere strictly to the provisions herein:

1. As part of the requisite requirements for Direct Entry application, all applicants' qualifications must be uploaded at the registration point (JAMB Professional Registration Centre (PRC), while the Head of the awarding institutions gets notified immediately through email to verify the candidates' claims.
2. The Institutions are expected to log in to the JAMB website via this link-<https://efacility.jamb.gov.ng/InstitutionSignin>. **Please, note that the link is also included in the mail sent to the Heads of Institutions once candidates' certificates are uploaded during registration. Institutions without efacility account should contact JAMB through the CAPS mail for details.**
3. On Login, by the left pane menu list, click on Certificate Verification (DE Registration) menu to view the list of all untreated candidates' applications.
4. To treat each candidate's application, click on the "**Process Button**" beside the name of the candidate to pull the candidate's full information, including the uploaded certificate.
5. To confirm that a candidate's certificate is genuine, select the "**first radio button**" and click the blue "**Authenticate Certificate**" button. This verifies the certificate as genuine and also sends an email and SMS to the candidate (and reflects on the JAMB's profile of the candidate) confirming the authenticity of his/her certificate.
6. To confirm that the certificate is fake or rather not issued by the institution, select the "**second radio button**", while you specify the reason for disapproving the certificate and click on the "**Disown Certificate**" button. This disowns the certificate and also sends an email and SMS to the candidate (and reflects on the JAMB's profile of the candidate) informing him/her why his/her certificate was disowned by the institution.
7. As soon as either of steps (5) or (6) above is completed, the response will be automatically sent back to the database for update.
8. The procedure is a continuous process and all candidates must be treated individually.

Note: a. For further guidance, a manual is provided

b. The Board will NOT consider for admission any candidate whose qualification is not verified by the awarding institution.

RE: ADVISORY ON 2024 DIRECT ENTRY (DE) REGISTRATION, VERIFICATION AND ALIGNMENT OF DATA

This advisory is issued to guide stakeholders on the alignment of data for the 2024 DE registration and verification of candidates' data

1.0 PREAMBLE

The Board has been receiving series of complaints from institutions on candidates with forged or fake A-level certificates. Each institution has the policy of verifying the credentials of admitted candidates to ascertain their authenticity. One of such exercises was carried out by Bayero University, Kano, where the results of 148 admitted students were verified and 142 of them were found to be forged or faked. The Independent Corrupt Practices and other related Offences Commission (ICPC) in conjunction with the Federal Ministry of Education and JAMB subsequently carried out a sting operation at the A-level examination venues across the country. The result of which was extremely embarrassing to the Education sector. The then Chairman of ICPC said that much.

As a result of this, the Board had to, with the approval of the Federal Ministry of Education, act appropriately and establish the Nigeria Integrated Post-Secondary Education Data System (NIPEDS) which has the mandate to verify all A-level certificates used in the DE application before admission is considered.

2024 DE CANDIDATES VERIFICATION FLOW

Find below the flow of candidates' verification by NIPEDS:

Every candidate presents his/her credentials for DE registration at any of the JAMB PRCs/State Offices.

- a. Upon receiving the document, it is classified as follows:
 - i. For IJMB, JUPEB, NABTEB or Cambridge (post-2018) certificate or awaiting result candidates of IJMB, JUPEB or NABTEB, the candidate data is compared to the databank on NIPEDS for such qualifications. The system checks with the candidate's number as supplied by the respective examination body. The system verifies alignment of name, qualification, subject and grades (where applicable). Once the alignment is confirmed, the candidate continues and completes his/her registration.

- ii. For other qualifications other than “i” above, the credentials of the candidates are transmitted to the respective institution to authenticate/verify the claim.
- iii. If the institution is compliant (credibility of prompt response to verification request in 2023), the candidate is allowed to complete his/her DE registration without waiting for verification of the result from the awarding institution. For the avoidance of doubt, the following 15 institutions are regarded as non-compliant for the on-going 2024 DE registration:
 - A. Four (4) Universities:
 - i. Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria (565 candidates);
 - ii. University of Nigeria, Nsukka (125);
 - iii. Ekiti State University, Ado-Ekiti (61); and
 - iv. Federal University of Technology, Owerri (12).
 - B. Five (5) Polytechnics/Monotechnics:
 - i. Nuhu Bamalli Polytechnic, Zaria (61);
 - ii. Akanu Ibiam Federal Polytechnic, Unwana, Afikpo, Ebonyi State (58);
 - iii. College of Health Technology, Calabar (25);
 - iv. Best Solution Polytechnic, Akure, Ondo State (24) and;
 - v. Federal College of Animal Health and Production Technology, Vom, Plateau State (24);
 - C. Six (6) Colleges of Education:
 - i. Cross River State State College of Education, Akamkpa (91);
 - ii. Kashim Ibrahim College of Education, Maiduguri, Borno State (72);
 - iii. College of Education, Katsina-Ala, Benue State (47);
 - iv. Osun State College of Education, Ila-Orangun, Osun State (27);
 - v. Shehu Shagari College of Education, Sokoto (25); and
 - vi. College of Education, Waka-Biu, Borno State (20).

2.0 EXPERIENCE/LESSONS FROM 2023 VERIFICATION EXERCISE

The Board had on 23rd February 2023 issued an advisory to guide the registration of candidates seeking admission through Direct Entry (DE) in the 2023/2024 academic session. That was to address the issue of candidates who intended to use forged or fake A-level certificates/qualifications to secure admission.

For effective monitoring, DE registration from 2022/2023 academic session, has been restricted to JAMB-PRCs (offices).

For 2023 registration, of the 44,866 candidates who applied for the DE (or converted from UTME) 1,957 have so far been disclaimed by institutions/examination bodies.

The verification exercise by the Nigeria Post-Secondary Education Data System (NIPEDS) also revealed some discrepancies which could unduly disadvantage students/candidates or provide avenue for their impersonation. The discrepancies are:

This advisory is issued to guide candidates with only IJMB, JUPEB and NABTEB on the process of application for alignment of data for the Direct Entry (DE) registration effective from 2024

1.0 PRE-DE REGISTRATION ALIGNMENT

Going by the experiences of the 2023 DE registration exercise, the Board has introduced, where necessary, the preregistration checks and data alignment for applicants with only **IJMB, JUPEB, and NABTEB qualifications**. This provision enables the system to authenticate the details supplied by a prospective candidate at the point of registration with what has been preloaded by the examination bodies. A platform **THIRD-PARTY LEVEL DATA ALIGNMENT PLATFORM (TALDAP)** has been provided to cater to this.

When a candidate's data (spelling of name, result/grade, subjects) do not align or are not included with the records supplied by the examination bodies, an alignment must be done on the TALDAP, before proceeding with the DE registration with JAMB.

It is worth noting that there are ONLY two (2) types of preregistration data alignment available on the TALDAP system:

- a. **Missing candidate's data alignment (data omission)** This type of alignment can only be carried out when at the point of registration, the exam/matric/registration number supplied by the candidate and on the presented credential of the candidate for a particular qualification (IJMB/JUPEB/NABTEB) does not return any candidate's data.
- b. **Data discrepancy alignment** This type of alignment can only be carried out when at the point of registration, the exam/matric/registration number supplied by the candidate and on the presented credential of the candidate, for a particular qualification, returns a candidate's data that contains name spelling mistakes/omission, different grades, and/or subject combinations, other than what was presented in the candidate's credential.

2.0 PROCESS OF APPLYING ALIGNMENTS FOR DATA OMISSION OR DATA DISCREPANCY

The processes are described below:

- i. **Visit NIPEDS A/level Home Page** Open the web browser and go to nipeds.jamb.gov.ng
- ii. **Click on Alignment of Data Application** Navigate to the alignment of data section on the homepage and click the “Visit Portal” button.
- iii. **Click on Apply for Alignment of Data button to begin the application process on the new page**
- iv. **Select the Type of Data Alignment** On the page,
 - a. candidates should choose the appropriate alignment type (missing candidate data alignment or data discrepancy alignment). If data discrepancy alignment is selected, the candidate can then select “alignment of name spelling”, “alignment of subjects” or “alignment of grades”
 - b. candidates should provide the examination number and year as shown on the claimed certificate/document;
 - c. candidates should provide a valid email address (preferably the one to be used or used for JAMB registration).
- v. **Provide the Supposedly Omitted/Correct Data:** In the subsequent step on the page, the candidate should input the name, subject, and grade, exactly as shown on his/her certificate/document and upload the proof/credential.
- vi. **Make Payment:** The final step involves making a payment.
- vii. **Application Completion** Candidates will receive an email for payment made which serves as a confirmation of the “submitted application”. An email notification will also be sent to the examination body informing them about the new application which they are to either recommend to JAMB or Reject. Any of the actions will have justifications. **A submitted application does not automatically mean approval.**

3.0 JAMB APPROVAL/REJECTION

Once the application is approved or rejected, the candidate gets an email confirming the approval/rejection of his/her application and the same is reflected on the profile of the candidate.

4.0 PAYMENTS FOR SERVICES

There would be a payment for the services to be rendered. Payment should be made using ATM cards or other methods displayed at the time of payment, including USSD payment and bank transfer.

The table below contains the approved fees for aligning candidates' data with JAMB records as supplied by the examination bodies.

Going by the experiences of the 2023 DE registration exercise, the Board has introduced, where necessary, the preregistration checks and data alignment for applicants with **IJMB, JUPEB, and NABTEB qualifications**. This provision enables the system to authenticate the details supplied by a prospective candidate at the point of registration with what has been preloaded by the examination bodies. A platform "**THIRD-PARTY A-LEVEL DATA ALIGNMENT PLATFORM (TALDAP)**" has been provided to cater to this.

This step-by-step procedure outlines how an examination body can recommend/reject an alignment of data application processed by a candidate:

i. Visit NIPEDS Home Page:

- a. Open the web browser and go to nipeds.jamb.gov.ng
- b. Navigate to the examination bodies portal section on the homepage and click on the “Visit Portal” button.
- c. On the new page, enter your login details and click on the “Submit” button

ii. View applications

Navigate to the Data Bank menu on the homepage and click on the “Data Alignment Applications” submenu.

iii. Recommend/Reject application

Click on the desired application. On the page shown, view the details of the application.

- a. **To reject an application:** Click on the “Reject Application” button. On the confirmation modal shown, provide the reason for rejection. Confirm your rejection by clicking on the “Confirm Rejection” button.
- b. **To Recommend an application** Click on the “Recommend Application” button. On the confirmation modal shown
 - Enter the reason for recommending the application
 - If the application is a data discrepancy alignment application, select the type of data discrepancy that is applicable (alignment of name spelling, alignment of subject, alignment of grade)
 - Upload the candidate data.
 - Click on “Confirm Recommendation” to submit the entered details. Once it is submitted, it awaits approval by JAMB before the uploaded data can be added to the bank

3.0 JAMB APPROVAL/REJECTION

It is important to note the following actions that take place once the approval/rejection process is completed by JAMB:

- Once the recommendation has been approved/rejected by JAMB, the system automatically sends an email to the examination body.
- the candidate also gets an email confirming the approval/rejection of his/her application.

DOES JAMB DECIDE "CUT-OFF" MARK ?

There is nothing like a uniform minimum national Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) score for any of the tiers of tertiary institutions and neither does the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) decide any such requirement for any institution.

The Board does not and has never determined any uniform national UTME scores otherwise known as "cut-off" mark by the general public for any tertiary institution because, in actual sense, there are no uniform national UTME scores.

The lucid process of admission which some section of the public occasionally expound is the exact process being followed in the conduct of admission exercise to tertiary institutions in the country. This process has even been improved upon with the elimination of human interference through its full automation with the introduction of the Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS).

For the purpose of emphasis, the Board conducts the UMTE and hands over the results to institutions for the conduct of admissions. However, before the admission exercise commences a policy meeting is held with all the Heads of the Institutions in attendance and chaired by the Hon. Minister of Education. At this meeting, the admission guidelines, which include recommendation s f r o m individual institutions and their preferred minimum admission scores, are presented and deliberated upon at the meeting and not JAMB as erroneously portrayed by some section of the public, because JAMB is only a member out of over a thousand participants at the meeting.

Prior to the meeting, for instance, more than 50% of the universities would have submitted their in writing their minimum scores of 200 and above to the Board for presentation to the meeting for the purpose of deliberation. The same applied for the other tiers of tertiary

institutions. The implication of this process is that no institution would be able to admit any candidate with any score below what they had submitted as their minimum score.

Perhaps, it is also apt to address the series of misconceptions as to what is generally described as "uniform minimum national UTME score" for admission into tertiary institutions in Nigeria entails. For some time now, many candidates and some members of the general public have been under the erroneous impression that there is a minimum national UTME score set by the Board, which they also refer to as "cut-off point". The truth is that there is nothing like a national minimum UTME score for all Universities, Polytechnics or Colleges of Education in Nigeria as it is only individual institutions which set their minimum entry scores based on their peculiarities.

The Board has no role whatsoever in the decision of the institutions to determine how or with what criteria they want to admit. The role of the Board is to ensure that the goalpost is not shifted in the middle of the game. Furthermore, in most cases, the UTME score is not the sole determinant of placement of candidates into tertiary institutions. As such, the undue attention to the so-called national minimum UTME score (UTME cut-off point) is a major conception of many ill-informed candidates who assumed that they have finally attained the benchmark having achieved the so-called minimum national score or "cut-off point" for admission.

It is, therefore, a double jeopardy for many candidates who subscribed to the popular myth of a uniform UTME score (cut-off) for all Universities, Polytechnics or Colleges of Education in Nigeria.

The myth also incorporates the erroneous impression that it is only the UTME score that constitutes the benchmark for admission. This is far from the truth. Hence, such candidates on attainment of

particular grades in the UTME celebrate in advance of their imminent placement in their institutions of choice, which in reality may not come to pass at the end of the day.

The Board, therefore, for the umpteenth time, is stating unequivocally that there is no uniform minimum UTME score (cut off) for all Universities, Polytechnics or Colleges of Education in Nigeria because each institution determines and submits to JAMB its minimum UTME score after analysing the UTME scores of its applicants against its available quota. It should, therefore, be noted that decisions at the annual Policy Meeting on Admission does not reduce this minimum prescriptions emanating from the institutions except in the few situations where these institutions had submitted minimum UTME scores that fall below what the Policy Meeting considers as the acceptable minimum score.

It should, therefore, be noted that UTME score is just one of the two or three scores that are generally cumulated to obtain the eventual aggregate score and ranking of the candidates by most institutions. Other parameters are Post-UTME/Post-A/L qualifications screening test score; O/L grade score; and in some cases, physical test (such as applicable in the Nigerian Defence Academy/Police Academy). Therefore, it is the score from all these segments that are added together to have an eventual ranking table

CESSATION OF ILLEGAL/IRREGULAR ADMISSIONS

🌿 All applications of admissions to **First Degree, National Diploma, National Innovation Diploma and the Nigeria Certificate in Education into Full-Time, Distance Learning, Part-Time, Outreach, Sandwich, etc.**, must be processed **ONLY** through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).

🌿 No Institution should advertise or sell “application forms” for admissions into the programmes. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.

🌿 Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and the three (3) Regulatory Agencies (National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) will ensure that all Tertiary Institutions comply with this policy directive. Other Professional Regulatory Agencies will also play a role in sanitizing the process.

🌿 The duration of all Non-Full Time Studies must be maintained as approved by the Regulatory Agencies. This is generally not less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the equivalence of Full Time.

ADVERTORIALS

🌿 Institutions that desire to place advertisement can do so with the requirement that candidates who sat for the current **UTME** (or **DE** candidates) should change to their institutions as First (1st) Choice rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application form or apply. This is to prevent the issue of double registration which is a violation of the mandate of JAMB.

🌿 It should be reiterated that no Institution should advertise or sell “application forms” for admissions into the programmes listed above. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
