MINISTERIAL DIRECTIVE REGARDING THE MENACE OF 'MIRACLE CENTRES' IN THE EDUCATION SECTOR AT THE SECONDARY SCHOOL LEVEL

JAMB hereby updates its regulations with the following ministerial directives:

- 2. In accordance with sections 5(1) (c) (lv) and 6 of the JAMB Act, the Hon. Minister of Education, Dr. Tunji Alausa, has directed that:
 - any school/CBT centre involved in examination malpractice and/or acting as a miracle centre should be derecognised for a number of years. The duration will be determined by the examination body:
 - if any school/CBT centre is derecognised by any examination body, other sister examination bodies should follow sult and derecognise the same school/CBT centre for the same number of years to run concurrently. This will send a very strong signal to operators of these miracle centres;
 - student(s) involved in examination malpractice should be barred from sitting for any external examinations in Nigeria such as those conducted by WAEC, NECO, NABTEB, etc, for three years using the instrumentality of NIN. Such a stringent measure will serve as a deterrent to other students and parents.

This directive is also in accordance with Section 16(2) of the Examination Malpractices Act, which states: "An examination body may, in the exercise of its powers under this section, circulate the name of an offending candidate, supervisor, invigilator, official, school, or examination centre to other examination bodies, which may impose similar

Reflecting on the challenges faced by the Board this year, Prof. Oloyede emphasized that while he accepts responsibility for the events that transpired, this does not excuse any stakeholder, including Board staff, from neglecting their duties. He assured that the Board would take appropriate action against any dereliction of duty.

He reiterated his commitment to exploring innovative methods for conducting examinations and expressed satisfaction that, despite the challenges encountered, there were no reports of examination leakage or similar issues.

JAMB CANVASSES SUPPORT AGAINST DIGITAL EXAMINATION FRAUD ... Says Over 3.000 Cases Under Investigation

he Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has called for a more radical approach to tackling the menace of digital examination fraud in the country.

The Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, made this call recently in Abuja. He described the new trend as not only worrisome and sophisticated but also one that is capable of jeopardising the future of education in the country while adversely affecting learning, research work and national development.

The Registrar underscored the need for urgent action on these new and worrisome discoveries and urged the public not to treat the issue with levity. While noting that some people rather than addressing the menace, are dissipating their energies on spreading unhelpful conspiracy theories and hatred

while our future is being jeopardised by these new crop of sophisticated digital fraudsters

"During the 2025 examinations, further high-level malpractices were uncovered, which led to the withdrawal of some results and the arrest of several culprits across the country.

"These unwholesome practices include: collusion of certain CBT centre/school proprietors to hack the networks of targeted CBT centres, thereby gaining control of candidates' computers and remotely submitting their responses to the relevant local servers of the compromised centres as recently discovered by security agencies, to whom we are profoundly grateful."

Other high-tech digital fraud according to Oloyede, included Alenabled photo blending of candidates with those of their impersonators, many of whom are current undergraduate students; registration with combined fingers, through combination of fingerprints from multiple persons for a single candidate's registration; and extension of Local Area Networks (LAN) from some dubious centres to remote "strong rooms" as well as pairing of candidates with professional mercenaries for the purpose of gaining access to the examination hall.

The Registrar, while lamenting that many undergraduates of tertiary institutions are found to be involved in this nefarious practice, disclosed that over three thousand candidates nationwide have been identified as either accomplices or beneficiaries of this extraordinary examination fraud

he Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has expressed gratitude to sister examination bodies for accommodating the Board's 2025 UTME resit examination within their tight schedules.

BLUEPRINT, WEDNESDAY, MAY 28, 2025: UTME: JAMB Disowns Messages Directing Candidates To Reprint Examination Slips: - The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board, (JAMB), has distanced

itself from circulating messages urging candidates to reprint their examination slips for another resit examination.

According to the Board, the misleading messages coming via a "spoofed version" of its 66019 short code urged candidates, who already sat for the resit and received their Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination, UTME, results, to reprint their slips. GUARDIAN, WEDNESDAY, MAY 28, 2025: 4,169 Teachers Fail, 8,705 Pass TRCN Professional Examination: - No fewer than 4,169 teachers across Nigeria failed the 2025 Batch 'A' Professional Qualifying Examination (PQE) conducted by the Teachers Registration Council of Nigeria (TRCN).

The Director of Certification and Licensing at the Council, Dr. Jacinta Ezeahurukwe, disclosed this in a statement announcing the results of the nationwide examination.

According to her, 13,782 candidates registered for the examination, but only 12,874, representing 93.4 per cent, participated, while 908 candidates, or 6.6 per cent, were absent. Of those who took the test. 8,705 candidates, or 67.62 per cent, passed, while 4,169, representing 32.38 per cent, failed the examination.

Dr. Ezeahurukwe gave a breakdown of the performance of some states, noting that Lagos State led with an impressive pass rate of 80 per cent, followed by Edo State with 73.3 per cent, Niger State with 69.2 per cent, and the Federal Capital Territory, FCT, with 68.3 per cent.

SAHARA REPORTERS, THURSDAY, MAY 29, 2025: WAEC Blames Three-Hour Exam Delay, 9PM Finish On Measures To Prevent Paper Leakage: - The West African Examinations Council (WAEC) has apologised for the delay in the conduct of the English Language Paper II and III in the ongoing 2025 West African Senior School Certificate Examination (WASSCE).

Candidates across several centres expressed frustration after the paper, originally scheduled for 4pm on Wednesday, May 28, did not commence until 7pm and ended by 9pm. Many of the candidates had concluded the Oral English (Paper I) in the morning and waited for several hours for the second and third papers, only for the materials to arrive late in the evening.

2025: Students Escape Death As Classroom Collapses During WAEC Examination In Taraba: - Final year students of Government Secondary School, Namnai in Gasol local government area of Taraba State. on Wednesday escaped death when a classroom building where they were writing WAEC examination collapsed following a heavy downpour. The students and teachers, including supervisors and corps members serving in the school were trapped in the collapsed classrooms and it took hours of efforts by residents of the community to rescue them.

Some of the students, including males and females, sustained various degrees of injuries while some had fractures on the legs, hands and arms. Eye-witness account explained that the incident occurred at about 6pm on Wednesday, few minutes after the students began the exams when heavy rainfall accompanied by wind storm started in the town. Dr. Alausa, accompanied by members of his team and received by school leadership, toured the school and observed students in real-time as they wrote their English examination using the CBT system.

NAIRAMETRICS.COM, THURSDAY, MAY 29, 2025: FG Introduces HND Programs In AI, Cybersecurity, Software Engineering To Align With Global Tech Trends: - The Federal Government has introduced new Higher National Diploma (HND) programmes in Artificial Intelligence (AI), Cybersecurity, Software Engineering, and Networking as part of a broader plan to modernise Nigeria's technical education system.

The Executive Secretary of the National Board for Technical Education (NBTE), Prof. Idris Bugaje, who revealed this noted that the initiative is aimed at aligning Nigeria's education sector with global technological advancements

Industrial Revolution.

Prof. Bugaje described the move as a major milestone in the efforts of President Bola Tinubu's administration to equip young Nigerians with relevant digital skills for the modern economy. "We have unbundled the traditional HND programmes into more specific skill areas. Beyond curriculum changes, Bugaje said the NBTE has also integrated digital tools into its governance and oversight processes. According to him, one key innovation is the deployment of a digital accreditation platform powered by Al to monitor academic standards, prevent faculty duplication, and curb malpractice in polytechnics.

NAIRAMETRICS, THURSDAY, MAY 28, 2025: WAEC CBT: Nigeria Won't Fully Meet Computer Based Test Infrastructure Needs By November -Alausa: - The Federal Government has admitted that Nigeria may not be fully equipped with the necessary infrastructure to implement Computer-Based Test (CBT) examinations for the West African Examinations Council (WAEC) by November 2025.

Minister of Education, Dr. Tunji Alausa, gave the update while monitoring the ongoing WAEC CBT examination in Abuja. He noted that while the transition to digital examination systems is already underway, the country faces significant challenges, especially in deploying infrastructure to remote locations.

"Are we going to be ready to provide every single needed infrastructure by

He said the bills reflect a collective desire to expand access to quality education and enhance academic training nationwide. He explained that the Federal University of Technology Act (Amendment) Bill, 2024 seeks to revise existing laws to reflect global best practices, thereby strengthening the capacity of universities of technology to meet

their core mandates in research, innovation, and manpower development.

This resolve aligns with the Board's determination to combat the emerging trends of infractions identified during the administration of the 2025 UTME. As is customary with the Board, charity must begin at

The Minister has issued a directive to all examination bodies to activate all clauses and provisions contained in the Examination Malpractice Act to serve as a deterrent. His position is clear: unless drastic measures are taken, those intent on undermining education in Nigeria will prevail. He reiterated that he will not be the Minister of Education while allowing such occurrences.

The management of the Board urges all staff to act with caution in light of this renewed commitment to combating infractions.

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular.**

- 2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
- 3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
- 4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
- 5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
- 6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.



RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE ON IMPROVEMENT OF THE QUALITY OF EXAMINATIONS IN NIGERIA

he Committee tasked with the improvements of the quality of examination in Nigeria has presented an eleven-point recommendation to the Honorable Minister of Education, Dr. Tunji Alausa. In accepting the report, the Honorable Minister expressed gratitude to the committee, which is chaired by the Registrar of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), for its comprehensive approach that included all relevant stakeholders. He assured that the implementation of these recommendations would be prioritized.

The Committee recommends as follows:

- All documents, including certificates, registration and result slips, etc., should contain NIN, photograph and date of birth to guard against identity theft and impersonation.
- 2. All Invigilators and Supervisors must register through NIN and subscribe to the Examination body's Short Code, using the same pattern of 55019/66019 of JAMB in order to track and have full information about the examination officials, including examiners, supervisors and invigilators.
- 3. Swapping Invigilators and Supervisors, not candidates, should commence with effect from the 2025 private SSCE due to the strong views against student swapping expressed by the four concerned examination bodies (WAEC, NECO, NABTEB and NBAIS) pertaining to security, logistics and the fact that centre details are traditionally printed on candidates' certificates.
- 4. Except where absolutely impossible, Invigilators and Supervisors should always be public officials/teachers on pensionable appointments.

- 5. The standard requirements of examination halls/centres should not be waived for any school, while the recommended seating arrangement should be 1.5m by 1.2m. or 1.8 sqm per candidate.
- All examination halls and centres should be equipped with stationary CCTV cameras for surveillance and monitoring purposes. In addition,
 - every examination centre shall have a mini control room where the CCTV camera is monitored for urgent and immediate alert;
 - all the four concerned examination bodies shall jointly own central control facilities for their use during their examinations to save cost; and
 - body camcorders should be deployed to examination halls and centres for effective monitoring.
- 7. At the point of entry into Basic School, every pupil must generate a unique code which is linked to his/her NIN which must be identified with the pupil throughout his/her educational journey in Nigeria.
- 8. The Federal Ministry of Education should interface with the National Assembly to enact an Act to establish a National Examination Malpractice Court/Tribunal for prompt prosecution of examination malpractices to serve as deterrent for others.
- P. The non-implementation of the 1999 Examination Malpractice Act suggests either a lack of political will or non-implement a bility. Consequently, the Committee recommends a review of the Act in such a manner that it can be immediately implemented to

- 10. The Committee endorsed the policy directive of the Honourable Minister that, rather than wait till 2027 as initially suggested, the CBE should be implemented for objective questions in 2025 private examinations and in full for school candidates in 2026.
- 11. The 30% Continuous Assessment component in the Senior Secondary Certificate Examinations has become a veritable source of corruption in the examination system due to the fraudulent process of inputting the scores in arrears. It is therefore recommended that the Nigerian Educational Research and Development Council (NERDC) and any other FME agency, which must have recommended the policy for the approval of the National Council on Education (NCE), should immediately be requested to review the Continuous Assessment System for the purpose of reducing or eliminating its abuse.

The committee comprises a diverse group of stakeholders, including representatives from the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB); Federal Ministry of Education; West African Examinations Council (WAEC): National Examination Council (NECO) and National Business and Technical Examinations Board (NABTEB). Others are National Board for Islamic Studies; Commissioners of Education; Vice Chancellors of Universities; All Nigeria Confederation of Principals of Secondary Schools: National Union of Teachers; Principals of Federal Unity Colleges (FUCs); National Association of Proprietors of Private Schools and National Parents-Teachers Association of Nigeria.
