2026 UTME: JAMB BEGINS AC OF CBT CENTRES

he Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has commenced the accreditation of examination centres for the 2026 Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME).

No fewer than 848 Computer-Based Test(CBT) centres have been slated to be covered in the accreditation exercise, which began on Monday, 15th December, 2025, throughout the country.

In his remarks at a virtual meeting with Chief External Examiners (CEES). Chief Technical Advisors(CTAS), Zonal Directors, State Coordinators, Computer Professionals Association of Nigeria (CPAN), ZITOs, SITOs, PITOs and other critical stakeholders partaking in the exercise, the Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, thanked all the participants for hearkening to the Board's call.

He enjoined the accreditation team to be focused, diligent and thorough in the onerous task ahead as well as be conscious of the consequences of their decisions.

Prof. Oloyede urged them to see their assignment as a call to national duty and implored them not to accredit centres that are not good for the Board's examination.

He advised the participants to be security conscious, avoid unnecessary risks,

minimal movement and acts that could expose them to dangers even as he assured that maximum security had been put in place for a hitch-free exercise.

The Board's IT Consultant, Mr. Damilola Bamiro, pointed out that the accreditation exercise was for only centres, which had successfully conducted the mandatory automated test deployed to check system readiness, with results determining eligibility for physical inspection.

He pointed out those areas that the team must focus attention on at each centre during the exercise to include: the coverage areas of the CCTV system, which must be wired, and must be HIKVision model with the recommended 16 channels, as well as having all the switches connected to the UPS.

Other accreditation requirements included: details of verifiable holding

rooms/halls and its proximity to the examination hall, identification of 250 functional laptops for new centres, spacious registration points with CCTV coverage, assessbility of network cables for biometric verification, use of star topology with all switches connected to the master switch to make troubleshooting easier.

In her presentation, the Director of Information Technology Services (ITS), represented by Mr Auwal Ahmed Bello, took participants through the operations of the Centre Management System (CMS) and other reporting details.

Similarly, the Chairman, CEES, Prof. Vincent Tenebe, and Prof. Bashir Galandanci, CTAS, restated their commitment to the success of the exercise while underscoring the importance of accreditation in the 2026 UTME ecosystem.

The duo promised to deliver a credible accreditation exercise that would stand the test of time while also thanking the Board for giving them the opportunity to contribute their



NAIRAMETRICS, SUNDAY, DECEMBER 7, 2025: WASSCE candidates can choose subjects across all streams, FG clarifies: The Federal Government has clarified that students registering for the West African Senior School Certificate Examination (WASSCE) can freely select subjects across science, arts, and social science streams under the revised Senior Secondary School Curriculum...

The clarification follows widespread confusion among students, parents, and school authorities about subject restrictions under the new curriculum. According to the Ministry, "There is no restriction or exclusion attached to the selection of any approved subject within the Senior Secondary School Curriculum. All subjects remain fully open for students to choose from, provided such choices are properly guided by the school authority, parents or a certified school counsellor..."



MANDATORY USE OF THE NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (NIN) FOR REGISTRATION WITH JAMB BY CANDIDATES APPLYING FOR NON-REGULAR PROGRAMMES

This Advisory is issued to all the concerned institutions, and candidates desirous of applying to study under the non-regular mode of study in tertiary institutions in Nigeria.

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular.**

- 2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
- 3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
- 4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
- 5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
- 6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.
- 7. Please be guided for compliance.



In every organized system, order is essential for harmony. The Public Service, being the engine room of governance, thrives on clearly defined structures of authority and responsibility. One of the oldest and most enduring principles that uphold this order is Seniority.

Understanding Seniority in Public Service

Seniority, in simple terms, refers to the relative ranking of officers within the same cadre or grade level based on the date of appointment, confirmation, or promotion and career progression. It determines precedence- who takes instruction from who, who supervises who, and, in many cases, who progresses first to the next level?

In the Nigerian Public Service, seniority is more than a matter of pride; it is a foundation of administrative order. It ensures that progression and recognition follow clear, transparent rules rather than arbitrary choices.

Seniority Determination in the Public Service

Seniority is guided by extant circulars and relevant rules in the Public Service Rules (PSR). Generally,

- within the same grade level, seniority is determined by the date of appointment or promotion into that level;
- where two or more officers share the same date, the officer with the earlier date of assumption of duty takes precedence;
- in the event of a tie, seniority may further be determined by the date of antecedent progression;
- for officers transferred or absorbed from other services, seniority is based on the date of first entry into the service.

This structured approach preserves fairness and helps prevent conflicts arising from ambiguity or perceived favoritism.

Importance of Seniority

Seniority plays a crucial role in ensuring discipline, respect for hierarchy, and predictability in career progression.

- Administrative Order: It provides a clear chain of command, helping organizations function smoothly and efficiently.
- Fairness in Promotion: It ensures that officers advance according to

- recognized service rules, preventing arbitrary promotion decisions.
- Experience and Mentorship: Senior officers often provide guidance, mentorship, and institutional memory to younger ones, preserving the service's culture of continuity.
- Conflict Prevention: When seniority is clearly established, misunderstandings about authority, reporting lines, and privileges are minimized.

Where records are unclear or not promptly updated, disputes could arise over seniority. This, many times, often lead to grievances, petitions, and avoidable tension in the workplace.

Common Pitfalls and Lessons Learned

Experience has shown that some officers misinterpret or neglect the importance of accurate records in maintaining seniority order.

For instance, there have been cases where officers failed to promptly regularize their promotions or update assumption dates, leading to disputes when seniority lists were released. In another instance, a staff member who transferred from another agency assumed he retained his former seniority, unaware that he needed formal re-ranking in his new service. Such oversights can have long-term implications on promotions, postings, and recognition.

The lesson is simple: seniority must be properly documented and consistently reviewed in line with the PSR and management directives.

Seniority and Leadership

Seniority should not be mistaken for entitlement. While it commands respect, it also comes with responsibility and exemplary conduct. Senior officers are expected to:

- Display maturity, fairness, and humility.
- Guide and mentor younger officers.
- Avoid using seniority as a tool for intimidation.
- Uphold professionalism and integrity in all interactions.

Final Word

True seniority shines not just in years served, but in the quality of service rendered and the positive influence exerted on colleagues and the organization. It is one of the pillars of stability in the Civil Service. It promotes order, fairness, and respect for institutional processes. Remember, to be a senior is not by just being earlier, it is by being exemplary.

...Varsity Registrars are Preservers of Institutional Memory - Oloyede

In his welcome address, Prof. Oloyede expressed delight with the visit and reminded the delegation that as custodians of institutional memory, they owe it a duty to their respective universities to mentor a new crop of professionals who will take over from them. He said as mentors, Registrars should not be subjected to the limitations of tenure as Vice Chancellors as they have a mandate to mentor Deputy Registrars, Assistant Registrars and the likes before they retire.

In his opening address, the Chairman of the Association, Dr. Bala I. Ahmed, expressed his pleasure for the opportunity granted them to visit. He said the visit was borned out of the fact that JAMB is considered a strategic partner with which ARNU could evolve closer collaboration in order to further consolidate on the gains of the nation's admission policies.

Continuing, he said, ARNU as a veritable and critical stakeholder in the admissions process, has noted with concern their current role and status in the admission process where Registrars are placed on the view only mode on the CAPS portal. According to him, the Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS), as is being currently operated, gives only the Vice Chancellor and the Admissions Officers direct access to CAPS, where they are active players while Registrars are passive observers.

Furthermore, Dr. Ahmed said Registrars are equally concerned about the non-recognition of the universities Registrars whenever requests for students' data is forwarded to universities. He cited the non-recognition of universities Registrars in the last JAMB Policy Meeting on Admissions as a good example.

Dr. Ahmed said it is their strong opinion that Registrars, who are the Heads of administration as well as custodians of students' records and signatories to students' admission letters, deserve more prominent role in the admission process and CAPS management. He also used the opportunity afforded by the visit to call on the JAMB Registrar to further strengthen admissions management in Nigerian universities.

In his closing remarks, Dr. Ahmed informed the Board that the association would be holding its 2025 Annual Retreat on 10th December, 2025, adding that topical issues surrounding university administration and management would be discussed at the event.

The Registrar, in his response, disclosed that, ever since JAMB was established he has been an active player as he had always represented his university in all JAMB-related activities. He said up till he became the Registrar of JAMB the universities' Registrars were not involved in the admission process. He noted that even though JAMB was the product of a joint effort by the university and other stakeholders, only the Vice Chancellors were presiding over admission matters. He added that in the current system, only three persons are involved in the Admissions process chain - the Vice Chancellor, Admission Officers and JAMB Desk Officers. He noted that while Admission Officers report directly to the Vice Chancellor, there was a need for the Registrars to know the flow of admissions in their institutions. He, thereafter, made provision for the Registrars to make their inputs through CAPS mail. He also recalled that the Board had scheduled a training session for all the Registrars in the six geopolitical zones of the country but he said to his greatest surprise, no Registrar has utilized that opportunity to date. Continuing, Prof. Oloyede said as Registrar himself, he can never work against his fellow Registrars. He added that he had initiated the accommodation of university Registrars in the admissions process immediately he became the JAMB Reaistrar because he believed these set of principal officers should know what is going on that is why he made them viewing partners on the admission portal.

Speaking further, Prof. Oloyede said the admission process globally follows the same pattern and that was why he made the Admission Officers to be held responsible and they can be charged to court as well as held liable for any breach of the rules of the game.

On the issues of the non-recognition of the Registrar at the last JAMB Policy Meeting, he apologised for the oversight adding that he had taken note of it.

With respect to the invitation for the association's annual retreat, he said it came in rather too late but promised to make up for his absence with more interactions going forward

quota to national development.

The Board's IT Consultant, Mr. Damilola Bamiro, pointed out that the accreditation exercise was for only centres, which had successfully conducted the mandatory automated test deployed to check system readiness, with results determining eligibility for physical inspection.

He pointed out those areas that the team must focus attention on at each centre during the exercise to include: the coverage areas of the CCTV system, which must be wired, and must be HIKVision model with the recommended 16 channels, as well as having all the switches connected to

the UPS.

Other accreditation requirements included: details of verifiable holding rooms/halls and its proximity to the examination hall, identification of 250 functional laptops for new centres, spacious registration points with CCTV coverage, assessbility of network cables for biometric verification, use of star topology with all switches connected to the master switch to make troubleshooting easier.

In her presentation, the Director of Information Technology Services (ITS), represented by Mr Auwal Ahmed Bello, took participants through the operations of the Centre Management System (CMS) and other reporting details.

Similarly, the Chairman, CEES, Prof. Vincent Tenebe, and Prof. Bashir Galandanci, CTAS, restated their commitment to the success of the exercise while underscoring the importance of accreditation in the 2026 UTME ecosystem.

The duo promised to deliver a credible accreditation exercise that would stand the test of time while also thanking the Board for giving them the opportunity to contribute their quota to national development.

ADVISORY ON PROCEDURE FOR PROCESSING OF (DEGREE) ADMISSION FOR AFFILIATED INSTITUTIONS

In 2022, the Board proposed that universities should take full responsibility for admissions into all degree programmes offered through institutions affiliated with them. However, this directive was not fully implemented, as universities were initially given the liberty to decide on the matter, pending a final resolution. To date, only the University of Ibadan has assumed this role of overseeing and coordinating the admissions of its affiliate institutions.

- 2. Following the meeting held on Monday, 18th August 2025, with various institutions regarding violations of matriculation guidelines, concerns were raised about the existing admission processing structure. Notably, institutions complained that they could not be held accountable for the misdemeanors of their affiliates under the existing processing format. As a result of this, the matter was revisited.
- 3. Consequently, it was resolved that the previously proposed process, where Mother-Institutions take responsibility for admissions into their affiliated institutions, should now be adopted and implemented by all universities with affiliates.
- 4. In light of the above, the Board has developed an updated procedure for the processing of admissions by both Mother-Institutions and their affiliates, as follows:
 - a. Head of the affiliated-institution logs into JAMB (CAPS) portal and downloads candidates for a particular programme;
 - b. The Head of the Affiliated-Institution (wherever it is based) logs into JAMB (CAPS) portal and sets admissions criteria for every programme, such as minimum scores for UTME, post UTME, aggregate, catchment and ELDS;
 - c. The Head of the affiliated institution proposes the qualified candidates for each programme on CAPS and it goes to the Head of the mother-institution;
 - d. The Head of the Mother-Institution (wherever it is based) logs into the JAMB (CAPS) portal and recommends the candidate to the Registrar of JAMB (or representative) for approval or declines the proposal with a reason for the rejection;
 - e. The Registrar of JAMB (or representative) approves the recommendation(s) from the Head of the Mother-Institution or declines the recommendation with a reason for the rejection;

- f. If the recommendation is approved, the candidate is notified through his/her email and SMS to either accept or reject the offer of admission. The two institutions can log in and view the status of the recommended candidates;
- g. If the candidate accepts the offer of admission, he/she can thereafter print his/her admission letter and access other services online from his/her profile.

NOTE: The Head of an Affiliated-Institution has access to "VIEW ONLY" all recommendations by the Head of a Mother-Institution.

5. All Universities serving as Mother-institutions, Polytechnics/Monotechnics, Colleges of Education and other institutes offering degrees in affiliation with universities are to be guided by this, please.
