ALL IS SET FOR 2026 UTME SLATED TO BEGIN APRIL 16

The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has finalised all arrangements to conduct the 2026 Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) slated to hold between 16th -22nd April, 2026.

No fewer than 2.2million candidates are expected to sit the UTME in about 966 Computer-Based Test (CBT) centres across the country following the deletion of 23 centres for poor performance in the

recently-concluded Mock-UTME.

It is expected by now that all the candidates must have printed out their examination slips for the exercise.

Candidates who have not done so are to visit our website at <https://www.jamb.gov.ng> and click on 2026 Slip Printing to print.

The slip contained vital information such as the date of examination, time, venue and other critical data that would facilitate a seamless examination and biometric verification exercise.

Additionally, necessary arrangements have been made for candidates living with disabilities to be processed through the machinery put in place by the JAMB Equal Opportunity Group (JEOG) headed by the erudite scholar and former Executive Secretary of National Universities Commission(NUC), Prof. Peter Okebukola.

The Registrar of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, has charged examination officials of the Board to demonstrate maximum commitment and dedication in the discharge of their duties, stressing that the success of the Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) depends largely on their performance.

Prof. Oloyede gave the charge during the virtual final briefing for Technical Officers

FG URGES EXAMINATION BODIES, SCHOOLS, PARENTS TO EMBRACE LIN

...Issues Learner ID To 1.9 Million Students

The Federal Ministry of Education (FME) has urged parents, schools, examination bodies, and other stakeholders to embrace and support the newly-introduced Learner Identification Numbers (LIN). The call came as the FG announced the issuance of LIN to at least 1.9 million students, marking the formal nationwide rollout of a digital identity system designed to transform Nigeria's education sector.

In a statement signed by Director of Press and Public Relations, FME, Mrs. Folashade Boriowo, the initiative, which was conceived by the Federal Ministry of Education (FME), was designed to generate a permanent, traceable academic identity for every learner in the country.

Hence, the LIN system is expected to

support learning continuity, strengthen education data management, and enhance service delivery across all levels.

The statement quoted the Honourable Minister of Education, Dr. Olatunji Alausa, as describing the development as a landmark reform aligning with President Bola Ahmed Tinubu's Renewed Hope Agenda, which prioritises human capital development and technology-driven governance.

The statement reads in parts, "This initiative marks a turning point in our education system. By assigning every learner a unique number, we are building a structure that supports each child's journey from classroom to career, while ensuring that no one is left behind.

"The unique identification number captures key details such as state of origin, local government area, school identity, and an individual student code.

"The system ensures uninterrupted academic records even when students relocate, change schools, or transfer between States.

"The initiative is built on the Digitised National Education Management Information System (DNEMIS), which has created a comprehensive national register of schools.

"Every school in Nigeria has now been assigned a unique ten-digit identification number, providing the backbone for an integrated and reliable national education database.

"Beyond securing examinations, the LIN system will help the government track student progression, identify out-of-school children, monitor dropouts, and address learning gaps, enabling timely and targeted interventions."

The first phase of the rollout covers more than 1.9 million candidates, who registered for the 2026 examinations conducted by the West African Examinations Council (WAEC) and the National Examinations Council (NECO). The next

phase of the project is expected to extend coverage to all learners in public and private schools nationwide.

LIN, when fully implemented, will be a major step towards strengthening examination integrity, curbing impersonation, and improving verification processes across the country.

Candidates are also to note that prohibited items are not allowed in the examination hall as the Board will not hesitate to invoke all extant laws on examination malpractices and unwholesome behaviours

during and after the examination.

Similarly, adequate provisions have been made for candidates with other challenges to sit the examination as the Board has all it takes to conduct an all-inclusive

examination in line with international best practices just as relevant technology has been deployed to safeguard the sanctity of the examination.

While assessing the conduct of the mock examination, the Registrar observed that most of the challenges encountered at examination centres stemmed from the failure of some technical officials to conduct thorough assessments of their assigned centres before, during, and after the exercise.

As part of disciplinary measures, he announced the delisting of 11 technical officers from the examination exercise for poor performance in the discharge of their duties, adding that further sanctions would be imposed upon conclusion of ongoing investigations.

Prof. Oloyede further disclosed that incentives would be given to teams that perform exceptionally well based on criteria such as prompt upload and download of examination materials, accurate documentation, and timely submission of reports.

According to him, the incentive scheme is intended to motivate personnel, who dedicate themselves to the successful conduct of the Board's examinations, while also reinforcing the importance of their

role in advancing the goals of the nation's education sector.

The Registrar also revealed that, as usual, the Board had deployed cutting-edge technology to curb all forms of examination malpractice that could compromise the integrity of the examination process.

He, therefore, urged officials to remain vigilant at all times, noting that examination infractions could occur through various means and methods.

On the issue of unverified candidates, Prof. Oloyede stated that the names of candidates, who could not be verified and had been flagged by the Board, would be collated and scheduled to sit their examinations at designated centres approved by the Board.

Also speaking at the briefing, the Director of Information Technology Services, Mrs. Fumilola B. Usman, called on all officials to work in synergy, stressing that the success or failure of the examination exercise depends on teamwork and effective collaboration among all personnel.

"The success or failure of this examination hinges on the ability of all officers to work together as a team, with everyone doing their

best. There must be proper synergy between officers from the Headquarters and those in the field, including key officials and ad-hoc staff. Any challenge encountered should be promptly communicated through the designated helplines for swift resolution," she said.

Mrs. Usman further charged all officers to be diligent and take their responsibilities seriously, warning that no excuses for negligence would be entertained.

The briefing was attended by over 800 examination officials, including Technical Officers, State Technical Advisors, Chief Technical Advisors, and other examination personnel.

Presentations were made by the Director, Quality Assurance Department, Mr. Danladi Mohammed, and the Board's IT Consultant, Mr. Damilola Bamiro, on the importance of accurate reporting, duties of examination officials, and the checklist for a hitch-free examination.

The Director, Test Administration Department, Mrs. Pius Ville, who gave the closing remarks, thanked the officials for their attention and urged that all hands must be on desk for a successful 2026 UTME.

MANDATORY USE OF THE NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (NIN) FOR REGISTRATION WITH JAMB BY CANDIDATES APPLYING FOR NON-REGULAR PROGRAMMES

This Advisory is issued to all the concerned institutions, and candidates desirous of applying to study under the non-regular mode of study in tertiary institutions in Nigeria.

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular**.

2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.

RECORD KEEPING AND DOCUMENTATION IN THE PUBLIC SERVICE

"What is not properly documented is easily lost, disputed, or forgotten."

Record keeping and documentation are central to effective administration in the Public Service. Every action taken, decision made, and communication issued forms part of the institutional memory and must be properly recorded for reference, accountability, and continuity. In an environment where policies evolve and personnel change, accurate documentation ensures that the organisation remains consistent, transparent, and efficient.

This edition of **HRM IN FOCUS** highlights the importance of proper record keeping and the role it plays in strengthening administrative processes.

Understanding Record Keeping

Record keeping refers to the systematic creation, maintenance, storage, and retrieval of official documents and information generated in the course of duty.

These records may include:

- Memos and official correspondence
- Reports and meeting minutes
- Personnel records
- Financial documents
- Policy documents and circulars

Proper record keeping ensures that information is available when needed and that decisions can be traced and justified.

Why Record Keeping Matters

Effective documentation:

- Preserves institutional memory
- Enhances accountability and transparency
- Facilitates continuity in administration
- Supports decision-making and policy implementation
- Provides evidence in case of audits, reviews, or disputes

Without proper records, organisations risk inefficiency, loss of information, and weakened governance.

Principles of Effective Record Keeping

1. Accuracy

2. Timeliness

Documents should be created and filed promptly. Delays in documentation can result in loss of critical information.

3. Proper Classification

Records should be systematically arranged using approved filing systems to ensure easy retrieval.

4. Confidentiality

Sensitive documents must be handled with discretion and accessed only by authorised personnel.

5. Accessibility

Records should be stored in a manner that allows easy retrieval when needed, without compromising security.

Common Challenges in Record Keeping

Some common issues affecting documentation include:

- Poor filing systems
- Misplacement or loss of documents
- Incomplete records
- Failure to update files regularly
- Lack of adherence to standard procedures

Addressing these challenges requires discipline, training, and adherence to established guidelines.

FCDA PAYS COURTESY VISIT, PARTNERS JAMB ON E-TESTING



As part of its efforts to produce quality manpower that would steer the affairs of the

Federal Capital Development Authority (FCDA), the agency is set to partner with the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) to conduct its upcoming staff promotion examination using the Computer-Based Test (CBT) mode. Richard Yunana, stated this when he led top management of the agency on a courtesy visit to the Registrar, JAMB, Prof. Ishaq Oloyede, in his office on Friday, 10th April, 2026.

He said the organisation also manages urban development, public buildings, and engineering services to build a world-class capital city.

ADVISORY ON PROCEDURE FOR PROCESSING OF (DEGREE) ADMISSION FOR AFFILIATED INSTITUTIONS

In 2022, the Board proposed that universities should take full responsibility for admissions into all degree programmes offered through institutions affiliated with them. However, this directive was not fully implemented, as universities were initially given the liberty to decide on the matter, pending a final resolution. To date, only the University of Ibadan has assumed this role of overseeing and coordinating the admissions of its affiliate institutions.

2. Following the meeting held on Monday, 18th August 2025, with various institutions regarding violations of matriculation guidelines, concerns were raised about the existing admission processing structure. Notably, institutions complained that they could not be held accountable for the misdemeanors of their affiliates under the existing processing format. As a result of this, the matter was revisited.

3. Consequently, it was resolved that the previously proposed process, where Mother-Institutions take responsibility for admissions into their affiliated institutions, should now be adopted and implemented by all universities with affiliates.

4. In light of the above, the Board has developed an updated procedure for the processing of admissions by both Mother-Institutions and their affiliates, as follows:

- a. Head of the affiliated-institution logs into JAMB (CAPS) portal and downloads candidates for a particular programme;
- b. The Head of the Affiliated-Institution (wherever it is based) logs into JAMB (CAPS) portal and sets admissions criteria for every programme, such as minimum scores for UTME, post UTME, aggregate, catchment and ELDS;
- c. The Head of the affiliated institution proposes the qualified candidates for each programme on CAPS and it goes to the Head of the mother-institution;
- d. The Head of the Mother-Institution (wherever it is based) logs into the JAMB (CAPS) portal and recommends the candidate to the Registrar of JAMB (or representative) for approval or declines the proposal with a reason for the rejection;
- e. The Registrar of JAMB (or representative) approves the recommendation(s) from the Head of the Mother-Institution or declines the recommendation with a reason for the rejection;

- f. If the recommendation is approved, the candidate is notified through his/her email and SMS to either accept or reject the offer of admission. The two institutions can log in and view the status of the recommended candidates;
- g. If the candidate accepts the offer of admission, he/she can thereafter print his/her admission letter and access other services online from his/her profile.

NOTE: The Head of an Affiliated-Institution has access to **“VIEW ONLY”** all recommendations by the Head of a Mother-Institution.

5. All Universities serving as Mother-institutions, Polytechnics/Monotechnics, Colleges of Education and other institutes offering degrees in affiliation with universities are to be guided by this, please.

2026 UTME: ABUJA ZONAL DIRECTOR ADVISES OWNERS OF FLAGGED CENTRES

The Director, Abuja Zonal Office, Mrs. Doom Mbachiantim, has advised proprietors of Computer-Based Test centres, whose centres were warned after the just-concluded Mock-UTME, to address all identified challenges before the conduct of the main UTME slated to commence on Thursday, 16th April, 2026. The affected centres had experienced various challenges that almost mar the conduct of mock

examination in their respective facilities during the exercise.

The Director urged the centre owners concerned to quickly fix those identified problems ahead of the UTME to avoid sanctions.

The indicted centres in the Federal Capital Territory have been given till Friday, 10th April, 2026, to rectify all identified issues.

To provide necessary assistance, a Zonal Technical Officer has also been assigned to conduct on-the-

spot assessment of the affected centres to ascertain their preparedness for the upcoming exercise.

In their responses, the centre owners expressed appreciation to the Board for giving them a second chance to fix the issues discovered at their centres. They also promised to do everything within their power to fix them ahead of the examination.

OLOYEDE RATES NEW TEST ENGINE HIGH

...Urges Parents to Protest Admission Violations

The Registrar, Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, has expressed delight with the trial test of the Board's new examination alternate route system, while also rating its success rate at about 90%. The Registrar made this statement when he featured on "Good Morning, Nigeria", a programme aired on the Nigerian Television Authority (NTA) programme and "Sunrise Daily" a Channels Television programme respectively on Wednesday, 8th April, 2026

The Registrar, who was in these media houses, discussed salient issues affecting tertiary institution admissions as well as the conduct of the upcoming 2026 Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) and other policy issues.

Prof. Oloyede urged parents to formally protest to JAMB if their wards are qualified but were not admitted, noting that the Board's Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS) has eliminated any form of so-called "connection", "long leg" or "man-no-man" headlining unfair and underhand admissions in the country.

He decried the desperation of some parents, who sometimes engage in illegality to ensure that their children secure admission by hook or crook. He also recalled how some parents had contacted him to solicit

admission for their wards not knowing that he did not do anything either by lobbying or influencing anyone as such requests for placement, more often than not, are treated on merit because of the deployment of the Central Admission Processing System (CAPS), a platform that made the conduct of admission easier, fairer, and gives equal opportunity regardless of candidates' social status.

"Unknown to them, I didn't do anything because we have a system that works and eliminates inappropriate behaviours and infractions.

"The Central Admission Processing System (CAPS) not only streamlines the admissions process, addresses challenges associated with the manual approach, restores the autonomy of tertiary institutions with respect to admissions, makes candidates the focus and empowers them with information on available choices of institutions and programmes, expands admission opportunities, but also eliminates multiple admissions, corruption and provides easily-retrievable data for decision making and research on the education sector in the country," he said.

He explained that CAPS also helps JAMB to focus on its founding ideals as the clearing house for admissions

into tertiary institutions in Nigeria.

He, therefore, urged parents to protest to JAMB if parents feels that their wards are eminently qualified to be admitted but are unjustly denied.

The Registrar also used the occasion to explain the extant guidelines on admission, as it centres on Merit, Catchment Area, and Educationally-disadvantaged States and the percentages allotted to these three critical groups.

On the new test engine also known as alternate examination route system, Prof. Oloyede pointed out that the idea was conceived to increase security, reduce operational stress during the examination and mitigate certain concerns and risks.

A former Vice Chancellor of Bayero University and Chairman of NIPEDS, Prof. Yahuza Bello, and the Vice Chancellor, University of Education, Alvan Ikoku, Owerri, Imo State, Prof Stella Ngozi Elemchi were guests at the media parley and made startling revelations regarding fake certificates, forgery, fraudulent behaviours bedeviling A' level programmes in the country as well as the series of efforts aimed at tackling the menace.

OGUN STATE COORDINATOR MEETS FLAGGED CBT CENTRES

The Ogun State Coordinator, Mr. Hakeem AbdulHameed, has held a meeting with CBT centres, whose performances were not deemed satisfactory in the just-concluded 2026 Mock-UTME in his office on 9th April, 2026.

The meeting, which was held to review the conduct of each of the flagged centres, was aimed at forestalling the recurrence of all issues capable of truncating the smooth conduct of the main examination.

Mr. AbdulHameed said efforts must be made to ensure that the 2026 UTME succeeds in Ogun State and the nation at large. He, therefore,

requested the representative of each of the centre to narrate their experiences during mock examination held on 28th March, 2026.

The representatives, in their various submissions, confirmed that problems such as keyboard issues, insufficient laptops, LAN connectivity, no Centre Technical Officer, among others were encountered but added that all these issues have been resolved in preparation for the main examination.

However, Mr. Ismail Odeyemi of the Federal Polytechnic Ilaro CBT Centre, stated that there was no longer any

IP conflict or LAN issues at the centre as all these have been resolved that same day. Hence, the centre was able to conduct the second session seamlessly.

The State Coordinator informed the Centre Administrators of the need to reply the warning letter issued to them, adding that they are expected to state that all identified issues have been resolved and confirming their readiness to run the autotest on 10th April, 2026.

He also informed the centres that some staff of the State Office will be visiting them to confirm that all the issues encountered during the mock examination have been truly fixed.

JAMB HAS ALWAYS COLLABORATED WITH SECURITY AGENCIES - OGUN COORDINATOR

The Ogun State Coordinator, Mr. Hakeem AbdulHameed, has restated the readiness of the Board to collaborate with relevant security agencies to enhance seamless conduct of its Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME).

The Coordinator stated this during a meeting with some officials of the Department of State Services (DSS) in his office on 7th April, 2026. According to him, collaboration with security agencies does not only happen during UTME as the Board has partnered with the Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (NSCDC) to safeguard its various offices nationwide.

The Team Leader, Mr. Obinna Gabriel, an Assistant Director at the Ogun State Department of State Services, said the Service has a good relationship with all federal agencies so as curtail any instance of security breach. He said the visit became necessary because JAMB is not a security agency and, as such, must be properly guided on proper security measures to put in place to safeguard lives and property during the upcoming 2026 UTME.

As part of these security measures, Mr. Obinna urged the Board to increase the number of security personnel deployed to examination centres especially those in the rural areas during the examination. He

also submitted that the Board should sensitize CBT centres on the need to fortify the facilities so as to complement its efforts as well as avoid conducting examination late into the night.

In his response, the State Coordinator expressed appreciation to the DSS for the visit. He stated that security personnel are always mobilised for the UTME adding that the Board neither encourages closing late in the office nor during the examination of period. He promised to escalate the advisory given by the Service to the National Headquarters of the Board for necessary action.
