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FG ABOLISHES HND DICHOTOMY, PRIORITISES TVE

In a landmark policy directive, the Federal Government has abolished the prevailing HND dichotomy and prioritised Technical and Vocational Education (TVE).

In the new policy thrust, Polytechnic would be empowered to award degrees. The Minister of Education, Dr. Maruf Alausa, dropped this hint at a high-level retreat of Council Chairmen,

Commissioners of Education, Rectors, Registrars and Bursars in Abuja.

He said the Ministry had prioritised Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) to ensure graduates were industry-ready, innovative and capable of driving economic growth.

In a statement from the Ministry, the Hon. Minister explained that the policy aligned with President Bola Ahmed Tinubu's Renewed Hope Agenda, which prioritised job creation, industrial growth and human capital development as well as bridging the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical application with a view to fostering industrial, agricultural, commercial, and economic growth.

He pointed out that the repositioning of technical and vocational education is to serve as a catalyst for national development and productivity.

Impressed with the impact of the National Tertiary Admissions Performance-Merit Award (NATAP-M) instituted by the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) on infrastructural development in tertiary institutions across the country, Commissioners of Education in the country have made a case for the inclusion of secondary schools as

beneficiaries of the awards as well.

The Commissioners made the appeal at a meeting with JAMB in preparation for the 2026 UTME/DE exercise held on Saturday, 24th January, 2026, in Lagos.

The nation's Education Commissioners, who were visibly-impressed with the series of critical infrastructural development that dotted the landscape of winning institutions across the country, urged the

Board's offices across the country.

The Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, during a meeting with critical stakeholders, advised candidates, who had biodata issues such as those relating to names, date of birth or who may wish to correct their data are advised to do so with the National Identity Management Commission (NIMC) before proceeding for registration. He pointed out that the Board would not correct or use any data other than the one generated from NIMC.

On registration timelines, the Registrar said, "The period of registration for UTME candidates, including those from foreign countries, is from Monday, 26th January, 2026, to Saturday, 28th February, 2026."

He reminded prospective candidates that, "e-PIN vending for the UTME began on Monday, 19th January, 2026, and ends on Thursday, 26th February,

2026, while registration closes on Saturday, 28th February, 2026."

For Direct Entry candidates, "Sale of 2026 Direct Entry (DE) application documents and e-PIN vending would commence from Monday, 2nd March, 2026, and end on Saturday, 25th April, 2026 and the sale would only be at the Board's Zonal and State Offices."

In the same vein, the Registrar announced that three categories of e-PINs would be available.

"There will be three categories of e-PINS: Direct Entry (N5,700); UTME Only Without Mock (N7,200); UTME With Mock (N8,700)."

The breakdown of the charges is as follows: "UTME/DE JAMB Application Fee: N3,500; Reading Text: N1,000; CBT Centre Registration Service Charge: N700; CBT Centre UTME Service Charge: N1,500; Bank Charges: N500; CBT Mock-UTME Centre Charge: N1,500."

On Examination dates, the Registrar

noted, "The 2026 UTME will commence on Thursday, 16th April, 2026, and end on Saturday, 25th April, 2026, while the Mock-UTME (optional) shall hold on Saturday, March 28th, 2026."

Meanwhile, the Registrar also used the opportunity of the meeting to issue a stern warning to all CBT centres against engaging in dubious fraudulent practices ahead of the 2026 UTME adding that such practices include extortion and vending above the regulated price, among others, noting centres found culpable will have their licence withdrawn as well as be prosecuted.

He also advised operators of CBT centres to desist from engaging staff with questionable character as ignorance would not be taken as excuse for infractions committed as centre proprietors would be held liable for any crime committed by their ad-hoc staff.

2026 UTME REGISTRATION: JAMB INVOKES NO VISION, NO REGISTRATION



As part of measures to curtail registration infractions and restore the sanctity of the Board's examination processes, the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has invoked the "No Vision, No Registration, No UTME" clause for any Computer-Based Test (CBT) centre that cannot be covered or viewed remotely.

The Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, announced this at a stakeholders meeting held with Peace Monitors, Chief Technical Advisors (CTAs), Chief External Examiners (CEEs), Zonal and State Coordinators on monitoring of CBT centres during the 2026 UTME registration exercise.

According to the Registrar, all centres participating in the 2026 UTME registration exercise would be monitored live from JAMB Headquarters.

"Any centre whose registration activities cannot

be viewed from the JAMB National Headquarters, Abuja, will not be paid, and such registration may be invalidated," he said.

The Registrar also stressed the compulsory use of Microsoft or Digitech Live Cameras for UTME registration, noting that only these cameras are allowed to be used for capturing the second image during registration.

The Registrar maintained that the measure is to minimize manipulation of pictures as detected during the 2025 registration exercise.

While giving the specifications of the type of cameras allowed, he said, "All

existing CBT Centres must have migrated to the HIKVision " For the CCTV, the recommended NVR/DVR is HIKVision. The NVRs must have a minimum of 16 channels to cover all areas of the examination centre.

"All CCTV systems must be wired, no wireless CCTV Systems CCTV cameras must cover all the examination area, verification area, holding room, walkways, examination hall, server room, as well as entrance and exit doors. Erring centres would be sanctioned including possible prosecution.

He also stated JAMB will not pay for re-configuration of CCTV routers of any

centre and such centres would bear the cost of reconfiguration before it can be allowed to operate.

He recalled that centres and individuals involved in unwholesome activities have been delisted and are being prosecuted warning that the Board would not hesitate to sanction any centre or individual involved in examination malpractice.

clear standards, strong regulation and quality assurance mechanisms to ensure global competitiveness and best practices.

He urged polytechnic authorities to entrench a culture of innovation through the creation of entrepreneurship centres, research hubs and robust industry partnerships, as well as identifying renewable energy, agri-technology, digital manufacturing and climate-resilient solutions as priority areas.

The Hon. Minister similarly tasked the managers of these critical sector on transparency, accountability, fiscal discipline, timely audits, prudent management of resources, and ethical leadership, which he said must define the new era in polytechnic administration. He also

called for fiscal discipline, timely audits, prudent resource and zero tolerance for corruption.

The Minister implored the attendees to imbibe a culture of sustainability while enhancing internally-generated revenue through the production of goods and services, develop eco-friendly campuses and build resilient infrastructure.

Dr. Alausa enjoined polytechnics, to produce what they consumed and support national needs by reducing dependence on imports. He, therefore, reaffirmed the Federal Government's commitment to supporting polytechnics through policy reforms, infrastructure upgrades and partnerships.

MANDATORY USE OF THE NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (NIN) FOR REGISTRATION WITH JAMB BY CANDIDATES APPLYING FOR NON-REGULAR PROGRAMMES


This Advisory is issued to all the concerned institutions, and candidates desirous of applying to study under the non-regular mode of study in tertiary institutions in Nigeria.

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular**.

2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.
7. Please be guided for compliance.

SABBATICAL LEAVE: ADVANCING RESEARCH, CAPACITY AND INSTITUTIONAL GROWTH

"Knowledge gained through research strengthens institutions and advances national development."

The Board recognises the value of advanced research, continuous learning, and intellectual exchange in strengthening institutional capacity and supporting national development. In this regard, provisions are made for **Sabbatical Leave** for eligible senior officers, as well as for the engagement of qualified external personnel on sabbatical.

This edition of **HRM IN FOCUS** highlights the eligibility, purpose, and approval process for sabbatical leave.

What is Sabbatical Leave?

Sabbatical leave is a special research-focused leave granted to eligible senior staff to enable them undertake structured academic or professional research relevant to the interest of the Board or national development.

It is a privilege designed to promote intellectual renewal, innovation, and strategic contribution to the Service.

Eligibility for Sabbatical Leave

To qualify for sabbatical leave, an officer must:

- Be on CONRAISS 13 and above
- Have served the Board meritoriously for a minimum of five (5) years
- Demonstrate the capacity to undertake properly organised research or study

Eligible officers may apply for sabbatical leave once in five (5) years.

Duration and Purpose

- Sabbatical leave is granted for a period of one (1) year, equivalent to twelve (12) months.
- The research or study may be undertaken within or outside Nigeria.
- The proposed programme must be relevant to the interest of the Board or national development.

This ensures that the outcomes of the sabbatical contribute meaningfully to organisational goals.

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...Human Resource Management in Focus

Engagement of External Sabbatical Personnel

In addition to granting sabbatical leave to its staff, the Board may also:

- Receive qualified sabbatical-level personnel from other institutions, when required.
- Such personnel shall possess the requisite qualifications relevant to the Board's needs.
- They shall be appropriately remunerated in line with applicable guidelines.

This provision promotes knowledge exchange and institutional collaboration.

Approval Process

The granting of sabbatical leave is not automatic.

- All applications are subject to the approval of the Board.
- Approval is granted on the recommendation of the Registrar.

This process ensures that sabbatical leave aligns with organisational priorities and operational requirements.

Why Sabbatical Leave Matters

Sabbatical leave:

- Enhances research capacity and innovation
- Supports evidence-based policy and practice
- Promotes professional growth and intellectual renewal
- Strengthens institutional relevance and national contribution

Sabbatical leave is a valuable opportunity for eligible senior officers to deepen knowledge, conduct impactful research, and return better equipped to serve the Board and the nation. Officers are encouraged to approach sabbatical leave with clear purpose, discipline, and commitment to value creation.

ADVISORY ON PROCEDURE FOR PROCESSING OF (DEGREE) ADMISSION FOR AFFILIATED INSTITUTIONS

In 2022, the Board proposed that universities should take full responsibility for admissions into all degree programmes offered through institutions affiliated with them. However, this directive was not fully implemented, as universities were initially given the liberty to decide on the matter, pending a final resolution. To date, only the University of Ibadan has assumed this role of overseeing and coordinating the admissions of its affiliate institutions.

2. Following the meeting held on Monday, 18th August 2025, with various institutions regarding violations of matriculation guidelines, concerns were raised about the existing admission processing structure. Notably, institutions complained that they could not be held accountable for the misdemeanors of their affiliates under the existing processing format. As a result of this, the matter was revisited.

3. Consequently, it was resolved that the previously proposed process, where Mother-Institutions take responsibility for admissions into their affiliated institutions, should now be adopted and implemented by all universities with affiliates.

4. In light of the above, the Board has developed an updated procedure for the processing of admissions by both Mother-Institutions and their affiliates, as follows:

- a. Head of the affiliated-institution logs into JAMB (CAPS) portal and downloads candidates for a particular programme;
- b. The Head of the Affiliated-Institution (wherever it is based) logs into JAMB (CAPS) portal and sets admissions criteria for every programme, such as minimum scores for UTME, post UTME, aggregate, catchment and ELDS;
- c. The Head of the affiliated institution proposes the qualified candidates for each programme on CAPS and it goes to the Head of the mother-institution;
- d. The Head of the Mother-Institution (wherever it is based) logs into the JAMB (CAPS) portal and recommends the candidate to the Registrar of JAMB (or representative) for approval or declines the proposal with a reason for the rejection;
- e. The Registrar of JAMB (or representative) approves the recommendation(s) from the Head of the Mother-Institution or declines the recommendation with a reason for the rejection;

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- f. If the recommendation is approved, the candidate is notified through his/her email and SMS to either accept or reject the offer of admission. The two institutions can log in and view the status of the recommended candidates;
- g. If the candidate accepts the offer of admission, he/she can thereafter print his/her admission letter and access other services online from his/her profile.

NOTE: The Head of an Affiliated-Institution has access to “VIEW ONLY” all recommendations by the Head of a Mother-Institution.

5. All Universities serving as Mother-institutions, Polytechnics/Monotechnics, Colleges of Education and other institutes offering degrees in affiliation with universities are to be guided by this, please.

STAKEHOLDERS' ENGAGEMENT: KATSINA STATE EDUCATION FUND HOLDS ROUNDTABLE WITH JAMB, OTHERS

The Katsina State Education Fund on Thursday, 15th January, 2026, held a stakeholders' engagement with the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and other educational actors in the State.

The roundtable, which was aimed at addressing the issue of career choice for senior secondary school students across the State, was chaired by the Executive Secretary of the Fund, Alh. Kabir Lawal Ruma, at the conference hall of the Fund.

In his speech, Alh. Ruma explained that the engagement was primarily to deliberate on effective modalities for conducting career guidance and counselling lectures for secondary school students towards guiding them to make informed decisions about their academic and career paths.

According to him, the lectures were scheduled to hold from 26th to 30th January, 2026, and designed to expose the students to various career options, subject combinations and future academic

opportunities.

The Executive Secretary emphasized that proper guidance and counselling plays a vital role in promoting academic excellence and reduce cases of wrong subject or career choices by students. He, therefore, called on parents and guardians to ensure that their children fully participate in the exercise, stressing that the programme will help students gain clarity on the core subjects relevant to their intended courses of study at tertiary institutions.

Alh. Ruma further disclosed that the Fund has lined up several education-focused programmes for the year towards complementing the efforts of the Katsina State Governor, His Excellency, Mal. Dikko Umar Radda, PhD, CON, in improving the standard of education across the State.

These programmes, according to him, included: JAMB training, special coaching in English and Mathematics as well as distribution of learning materials to schools, among others.

In his concluding remarks, he solicited the support of stakeholders for the successful implementation of these initiatives.

Umar, Umaru Musa Yar'Adua University; Zainab Inusa Mbase, Ministry of Basic and Secondary Education; Mrs. Yeche Ehazadath, Federal University, Dutsinma Katsina; Dr. Abdu A. Charanchi, Al-Qalam University Katsina; Mal. Nasiru Garba Magashi, JAMB, Katsina State Coordinator; Prof. Ibrahim Lawal Kane, Yusuf Bala Usman College of Legal Studies, Daura; Engr. Dr. Lawal Abdu, Hassan Usman Katsina Polytechnic; Dr. Umaru F. Abdu, FCE, Katsina; Sani Inuwa Danmusa, Ministry of Higher Education; Dr. Buhari Abdulkarim, Isa Kaita College of Education and Bishir Ahmed, SUBEB.

Board to consider the inclusion of secondary schools in the relevant categories of the awards.

According to the Commissioners, the extension of this privilege to secondary schools would go a long way towards tackling infrastructural deficits and gaps, which has left some of the schools in deplorable conditions.

They commended JAMB for the laudable initiative, stating that a replication of same in the secondary school sub-sector would enhance excellence, healthy competition, compliance and enforcement of standards, as well as promote teaching and learning.

With respect to other issues tabled before the Commissioners for discussion during the meeting, the distinguished stakeholders resolved that the Board's current systems and procedures should be sustained as they comply with global dictates and best practices.

The forum also supported JAMB campaign against school-based registration, stating that schools should not be involved in UTME registration or bulk registration even as they urged fellow commissioners to help sensitize the public on the

negative effects of such acts on account of the increased possibility of data mismatch and other infractions that could result from such registrations.

Earlier, the JAMB Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, in his remarks, described the Commissioners as critical stakeholders in the onerous task of laying a solid foundation for the education sector, quality control, assessment and enforcement of standards.

He said, "As Education Commissioners with strong grassroots connections, your support and feedbacks are vital in shaping our policies and keeping the public well-informed, particularly on matters affecting public examination bodies.

"We appreciate your participation and constructive contributions as we work together to advance quality education in Nigeria."

He also told the forum that the meeting was held, "To collaborate with them with a view to ensuring a seamless registration and conduct of the 2026 UTME/DE. Share the Board's vision, policies, and strategies for the 2026 UTME exercise, including new measures to strengthen integrity and efficiency, leverage State platforms

and networks to support effective public sensitisation and information dissemination to candidates and stakeholders."

Continuing, he said the meeting provides an avenue for the Board to obtain constructive inputs from State Commissioners on the best ways to refine existing plans and improve operational outcomes, while recognising their critical role in grassroots engagement, and strengthen joint efforts to curb examination malpractice and other unwholesome practices.

"The meeting seeks shared ownership, consensus, and coordinated action between JAMB and State Governments to deliver a credible and successful 2026 UTME/DE exercise."

In essence, the meeting afforded the Board the opportunity to intimate the participants on some of the policy directions of the government as they concern accreditation of centres, registration, application requirements, sales, e-PIN vending, cashless regime, examination malpractice, new trends, among others, and the need for the forum to join hands with JAMB to have a seamless 2026 UTME.

(Note: This number (SIM) remains your unique identification for all your transactions with the Board for present and future transactions (application).

- 4.2.11 Candidates who procure SIMs only for registration with JAMB (and not in use) are advised to take advantage of and use the **Keep My Number (KMN)** facility offered by their respective Telcos. This feature keeps the SIM alive even if unused by the candidate but not have been used by another person to register for UTME/DE (in the past). Do not use Post-paid or special bundle package lines. They do not work unless specially loaded with credit.
- 4.2.12 Profile Code of 10 characters will be created by the candidate on the same telephone (SIM) number. Returning Candidates for previous years will still receive same profile code on the same number previously used. Note that the profile remains the same for the candidate for present and future applications with the Board.

- 4.2.15 JAMB does not entertain any request for change of SIM number after profile creation.
- 4.2.16 Candidate will present the profile code at the point of procurement of application document from Banks, HHMs, MFIs, Switches, USSD Partners). An e-PIN is then sent as text message to the candidate's phone.
- 4.2.17 Candidate will present the Profile code and e-PIN at any JAMB accredited CBT Centre for registration.

- 4.2.18 The application cannot be completed until the candidate's biometrics (all ten fingers) are captured and photograph taken physically (the submission of passport photograph). Successful capture of biometrics and photograph will authorise a candidate to print his/her e-registration slip (Candidate must use at least two fingers; any of the two fingers can be used to print his/her registration slip. The fingerprint verification shall be required for any further transaction with JAMB on the candidate's profile).
- 4.2.19 **GROUP/SCHOOL BASED REGISTRATION OF CANDIDATES IS NOT ALLOWED FOR CANDIDATES REGISTERING AT THE CBT CENTRE.**
- 4.2.20 Only candidates, whose biometric verification is successful on examination day would be permitted to sit at the UTME or Mock.
- 4.2.21 Candidates with peculiar biometric challenges can only register at JAMB National and State Offices. Arrangements must be made for this through JAMB State Offices.

- 4.2.22 **RETRIEVAL (IN CASE OF MISTAKE/LOSS) OF PROFILE CODE AND SELF-SERVICE**
- 4.2.23 To retrieve a lost Profile Code, send the word **[RESEND]** from the same mobile number to 55019 or 66019 as a text message.
- 4.2.24 Candidates can reset lost or forgotten Profile Password on their registered cell phone number by sending the word **"PASSWORD"** space (the email address) from the same mobile number as a text message to 55019 or 66019.

- 4.2.25 **TICKETING (FREE COMPLAINTS)**
- 4.2.26 For all complaints on JAMB processes including MIN and Profile Code related matters, a candidate should create a support ticket at <https://www.jamb.gov.ng> by selecting the Quicklinks, and **UTME Ticket/Support** with his/her e-mail address with the Board. The candidate then provides his/her name, phone number as well as the nature of the complaint, and submits a complaint once on a drop-down and thus summarises the nature of the complaint. He/she should also attach supporting documents, if any.
- 4.2.27 **COMPLAINTS FROM APPLICANTS ARE MERELY NOTED AS WE DO NOT DISCLOSE OUR CLIENTS' CONVERSATIONS WITH OTHERS. WRITING OF LETTERS IS NOT NECESSARY. INSTEAD, ALL COMPLAINTS SHOULD BE CHANNLED THROUGH THIS ONLINE TICKETING SYSTEM FOR PROMPT RESPONSE AND RESOLUTION.**

- 4.2.28 **JAMB'S PAYMENT POINTS**
- 4.2.29 The e-PINs are sent to the candidates' mobile phones. Participating financial institutions are responsible for collecting the profile code directly from the candidate's phone, collect payment and send the e-PIN electronically via SMS to the candidate on the code. The candidate payment through a POS system and provide evidence of payment.
- 4.2.30 **STEPS TO FOLLOW:**
- 4.2.31 (a) Present Profile Code and payment (N5,000) to the JAMB UTME/DE (NIPDC) and (b) 700 (UTME WITH MOCK).
- 4.2.32 The e-PIN is then delivered to the candidate's unique telephone number.

- 4.2.33 **PROCEDURE FOR REGISTRATION AT THE FOREIGN CENTRES**
- 4.2.34 The Board conducts registration and UTME in the following cities: Abidjan, Accra, Banjul, Bata, Cotonou, Jeddah, Johannesburg, London, Malabo, and Nouakchott. The Nigerian Consulate (Embassy) in each of the cities (countries) can be contacted for guidance on the registration and examination.
- 4.2.35 Registration fee for candidates from the 10 foreign countries is Thirty United States Dollars (US\$30) in each of the 10 locations or its local equivalent.
- 4.2.36 **NO REFUND OF REGISTRATION FEE**
- 4.2.37 Any person or organisation that wishes to distribute any application documents to prospective applicants should contact the Board on

- 4.2.39 (a) If e-PIN is not Received or Lost, send [UTME/PIN] from the unique number to 55019 or 66019 for UTME/DE.
- 4.2.40 The e-PIN would then be retrieved and delivered to the candidate's mobile phone.

- 4.2.41 **AFTER SUCCESSFUL PAYMENT AND OBTAINING E-PIN, CANDIDATE SHOULD PROCEED TO ANY OF THE JAMB-ACCREDITED CBT CENTRE FOR REGISTRATION.**
- 4.2.42 **REGISTRATION CENTRE**
- 4.2.43 (a) Registration is carried out only at the accredited Computer-Based Test (CBT) Centres.
- 4.2.44 (b) Each candidate should verify accredited CBT centre list on the Board's website (<https://www.jamb.gov.ng>) and JAMB office, with his/her profile code and e-PIN.

- 4.2.45 **VIEW OF REGISTRATION/REGISTRATION AT CBT CENTRES**
- 4.2.46 All candidates participating in the 2026 registration process must be monitored by the Board's personnel. Any centre whose registration activities are not viewed from the headquarters will not be paid, and each registration may be terminated.

- 4.2.47 **CONCLUSION OF THE REGISTRATION PROCESS AT CBT CENTRES:**
- 4.2.48 A candidate who has successfully completed registration and e-PIN at any JAMB-accredited CBT Centre for registration. A candidate's photograph and biometrics (all ten fingers) would be captured at the CBT Centre.

- 4.2.52 (c) Provide a confirmation with the candidate's (first and last name).
- 4.2.53 (d) Upload relevant documents.
- 4.2.54 (e) Provide choice of institutions, course of study (programme), UTME subjects and choice of examination (optional) Mock examination and Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) (actual examination).
- 4.2.55 (f) Review entries and confirm correctness, and
- 4.2.56 (g) Print Registration Slip (UTME/DE) and AUTHENTICATION to confirm valid fingerprint. [UTME/DE, Note that authentication with your fingerprint removes blame of error from CBT centres. Candidates are to check before confirming with their fingerprint.

- 4.2.57 **1.2.2 Candidates, who are awaiting results, should supply (upload) the results online at the JAMB portal as soon as they are available. No recommendations from any institution will be considered by JAMB if the candidate does not upload his/her result on the portal of JAMB. The institution is allowed to take a new picture/photograph, biometrics or require any other upload of result. All results are downloadable by institutions from the Board's website (and the download is tracked to avoid abuse).**
- 4.2.58 **1.2.3 Candidates are to note that their participation on their PIN should tally with information on their other supporting documents.**

- 4.2.59 **1.2.4 PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (PWD)**
- 4.2.60 To ensure inclusion, the following categories of candidates are to indicate their disability for special attention:

- 4.2.62 Candidates who are blind or to indicate by selecting **BLIND** from the dropdown options and also tick the closest designated JSCG on fee and preferred mode of examination.

- 4.2.63 A special indicator for the deaf/hearing has been created to identify them for special attention during the examination.
- 4.2.64 To promote inclusivity, the Board fully wills registration for the blind, the deaf and the hearing on wheel chairs who possess the required 5 credits at the point of registration.

- 4.2.65 **1.2.6 OTHERS**
- 4.2.66 Candidates with **Albinism, Deafness, Dyslexia, Dyscalculia and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), Autism, Learning Disabilities, Cerebral Palsy, Disfigurements, etc.** to indicate by clicking on the appropriate box as to be identified and assigned to the JAMB Inclusive Opportunity Group (IOPG) for special attention.

- 4.2.67 **1.2.7 BIOMETRIC CHALLENGES**
- 4.2.68 (a) No candidate will be allowed to enter the examination hall or sit at the examination if their biometrics is not verified.
- 4.2.69 (b) Candidates with biometric abnormalities can only register and take examination at the Abuja Headquarters of the Board. The Board will facilitate their travel.

- 4.2.70 **4.0 DATES AND VENUE FOR THE 2026 UNIFIED TERTIARY MATRICULATION EXAMINATION**
- 4.2.71 The 2026 UTME will commence on **Thursday, 16th April, 2026** and end on **Saturday, 25th April, 2026**.
- 4.2.72 The venue of the examination will be at **ANY** centre in the candidate's chosen examination town.

- 4.2.73 **JAMB DOES NOT POST ANY CANDIDATE TO ANY EXAMINATION TOWN (OR GROUP OF TOWNS) OTHER THAN THE ONE CHOSEN BY THE CANDIDATE AT THE POINT OF REGISTRATION. REGISTER ON THE DATE SINCE YOUR PREPARED TOWN MAY NO LONGER HAVE SPACE FOR YOU. NOTE THAT THE CHOICE OF A GROUP OF TOWNS IMPLIES THAT YOU CAN BE POSTED TO ANY OF THE TOWNS IN THE CHOSEN GROUP.**

- 4.2.74 **7.0 REGISTRATION FEE/PROCUREMENT OF REGISTRATION PINs**
- 4.2.75 Candidates should note that e-PINs purchased are valid to individual candidates and are not transferable.
- 4.2.76 Candidates are advised to keep as private and confidential their security details such as registration numbers, passwords/numbers of ATM cards, email addresses and e-PINs. No centre should be allowed to equal or accept a candidate's possession.

- 4.2.77 **8.0 OPTIONAL MOCK-UTME**
- 4.2.78 Mock-UTME (if offered) will hold on Saturday, March 28th 2026.
- 4.2.79 **9.0 GENERAL INFORMATION**
- 4.2.80 The registration fee is non-refundable.

- 4.2.81 Candidates are advised to read and understand the various guidelines on admission on the website and the information shown on the scan QR Code on how to complete the online registration before commencing the process of registration. He/she is also to sign and submit an affidavit of standards.
- 4.2.82 Candidates are to note that irrespective of their choice of programme, they will also be tested on a general test: **The Light Reading Test** by Kobi Alesi Garba. All Candidates are also expected to observe the test.

- 4.2.83 Candidates/Officers would not be allowed to enter the examination centre with weapons, mobile phones, mobile phones, electronic devices, or any pervious. Only pencils are allowed.
- 4.2.84 Candidates are warned that the Board does not require nor endorse the services of any cybercafe, school or educational institution other than accredited CBT centres for the exercise.

- 4.2.85 Examination malpractice is a criminal offence that attracts, in addition to the cancellation of results, publication of names and pictures of such offenders. Candidates are to ensure they read and endorse the **"Declaration Clause"** on the registration portal.
- 4.2.86 **10.0 NON-REGISTRATION OF ILLEGAL REGISTRATION**

- 4.2.87 **10.1 PROCEDURE FOR ILLEGAL REGISTRATION**
- 4.2.88 All admission offered by institutions must be from JAMB and only printed on e-Office. Any offer of admission from any tertiary institution without JAMB Admission letter is illegal and immediately null and void. Any candidate, who accepts admission from any institution that is not from JAMB or who does not have a JAMB Admission letter is liable to be reported to the Board and will not be recognised as a candidate for admission.

2026 UTME REGISTRATION: ABUJA ZONAL DIRECTOR HOSTS NIPOST

Ahead of the 2026 Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) registration scheduled to commence on Monday, 26th January, 2026, across the Board's accredited registration centres nationwide, the Abuja Zonal Director of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Mrs. Doom Mbachiatim, on Monday, 19th January, 2026, played host to a delegation of the Nigeria Postal Services (NIPOST), led by the FCT Post Manager, Mr. Tijani Idakwoji Balla.

The NIPOST helmsman, in his speech, stated that NIPOST, as a participating financial institution, in the 2026 UTME/DE registration exercise, has concluded all necessary arrangements for a seamless electronic-PIN (e-PIN) vending, disclosing that his staff had been strategically placed at various

approved registration centres in the FCT for the exercise.

Continuing, he disclosed that some JAMB Accredited Computer-Based Test (CBT) centres in the past had denied NIPOST access to their premises to vend PIN, while praying the office for prompt intervention to avoid a repeat occurrence in the coming exercise.

In her response, the Director expressed appreciation to the delegation for the visit, while promising her unalloyed support to the service provider in the coming exercise. She stressed that any accredited CBT centre that denied any e-PIN vendor access to its facility would be decisively dealt with.

Furthermore, she urged the Service to properly train its vendors as they would be held liable for their actions and inactions, particularly, those capable of undermining the integrity

of the exercise.

Other notable members of the delegation was the FCT NIPOST Head of Operations, Mrs. Cecilia Gaja.

In a related development, a delegation of the Abuja Zonal Office has, on Friday, 23rd January, 2026, taken its advocacy to the Lightway Academy, Wuse 2, Abuja, to sensitize prospective 2026 UTME candidates on the Do's and Don'ts of UTME registration so as to guide them against avoidable and costly mistakes in the exercise.

In his remarks, the Executive Director of the Academy, Barr. Joyce Agbese, commended the Board for its proactiveness, especially by taking time out to sensitize candidates and other stakeholders on the UTME registration and admission-related matters. He encouraged the Board to continue to be a beacon of hope to the Nigerian educational sector.

IBADAN ZONAL OFFICE INTERACTS WITH CBT CENTRE OWNERS

Against the backdrop of its preparations for the upcoming 2026 UTME/DE registration exercise, the Ibadan Zonal Office of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) on Tuesday, 20th January, 2026, held an interactive session with CBT Centre Administrators in the Zone.

The meeting, according to the Zonal Director, Mrs. Temitope Akintola, was aimed at advancing the Board's result-oriented plans for the 2026 UTME registration exercise as well as the sanctity of the registration process while intimating CBT centre owners of the demands of the Board and the ethics of the exercise.

In her address, Mrs. Akintola painstakingly reviewed the 2025 registration as a benchmark of lessons to be used for the 2026 UTME registration exercise adding that, "It is an important foundation to build on for achieving 2026 set targets."

She also reminded the CBT centres of the guidelines for the exercise as emphasised by the Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, and other management staff of the Board in line with the the Board's mandate.

Key officers of the Zonal Office also took turns to educate old and new centres on the sensitive nature of the registration and examination exercises; the 2026 UTME Registration guidelines; the Board's new innovations; the roles and responsibilities of CBT centres; security measures for examination officials and the Board's ICT infrastructure; the Board's prioritization of data privacy in line with the the provisions of the Nigeria Data Protection Act (NDPA) 2023; support and complaints resolution aimed at providing timely solutions to issues and the open-door policy put in place by the Zonal Office to guide centres through the complex and peculiar issues that may arise during the registration exercise.

While referencing different parts of the presentations, the Director implored centres to embody the spirit of integrity and professionalism which are the Board's hallmarks. She reminded them of the need to frown at those things the Board frowns at. She also underscored the place of sanctions for centres that commit infractions or go against the guidelines, pointing to the Board's insistence on a level-playing

field where no one is favoured over another.

She equally touched on the sensitivity of the exercise and how this understanding should guide the centres. This, according to her, drives the need for centres to adhere to the basics but important guidelines such as the provision of a dual-screen setup for registration, continuous education and supervision of centre personnel, zero tolerance for the unnecessary collection of candidates' data, complete avoidance of group registration and an absolute compliance with the the recommended treatment of candidates with biometric issues.

The Director charged the centres to remain professional in their dealings and promised them the unwavering support of the Registrar and the Board's management.

In their responses, CBT Centre Administrators pledged to deliver a registration and examination exercise that will reflect the values that the Board represent. They added that they are committed to giving their best for the success of this important national assignment.



DOMINICAN UNIVERSITY LAUDS JAMB ON TRANSPARENCY

The CBT Centre owners, in their response, assured the Board of a better outing in the 2026 registration exercise in the State.

The Ag. Coordinator also used the opportunity to warn institutions of higher learning in the country against backdoor admissions and advised them to always follow all rules and regulations governing the admission process as issued by the Board.
