

he Vice Chancellor, Federal University of Health Sciences, Ila-Orangun, Prof. Akeem Olawale, has restated the commitment of the young institution to adhere to all set standards, operational principles and policy guidelines on admissions. Prof. Olawale gave these remarks when he led a delegation of the Principal Officers of the institution on a courtesy visit to the Osun State Office of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Osogbo, on Tuesday, 13th September, 2022.

The erudite Professor of Otorhinolaryngology

and Immunobiology, who was represented by the Registrar of the institution, Mr. Kayode Babamale, said they were in the office on a familiarisation visit to the Board.

In his welcome address, the Osun State Coordinator, Mr. Babatunde Jacob, who received the delegation, assured them of the Board's maximum cooperation at all times.

Furthermore, Mr. Jacob admonished the institution to shun all forms of irregularities in the admission process as the Board had foreclosed the condonement of underhand admissions stressing that all admissions must be processed through the Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS).

Continuing, he urged the institution to comply with all policy guidelines on admissions as agreed upon during the 2022 Policy Meeting on Admissions held at the International Conference Centre, Abuja.

Responding, Prof. Olawale expressed gratitude to the State Coordinator for taking the time to enlighten the school on the technicalities of the admission process. He stated that the institution would strive to do things in line with extant rules and regulations.

JAMB CONDUCTS SUPPLEMENTARY UTME FOR 67 CANDIDATES

he Board has scheduled Saturday, 24th September, 2022, for 67 candidates, who had registered for the 2022 UTME, but who could neither sit the examination nor take the just-concluded Mop-Up UTME owing to one challenge or another, to take their examination at specially-designated centres.

It would be recalled that after the 2022 UTME, the Board had reviewed the entire exercise and those candidates with biometric challenges were given the opportunity of sitting a mop-up examination.

The Board also announced that since the

conduct of a mop-up examination is a stopgap measure, it would not be allowed to be a permanent feature of its calendar. Therefore, any candidate presenting any strange challenge(s) would have to indicate or declare such peculiarities at the point of registration for them to be given special consideration and allocated to centres within its National Headquarters, Abuja, for close monitoring as the Board had phased out the conduct of mop-up examinations.

However, in spite of the discovery of series of suspicious challenges presented by some candidates, the Board has, on account of its avowed commitment to equity and fairness, scheduled another set of 67 candidates to sit the examination at designated centres, under close scrutiny of the Board.

This decision to give these set of candidates this unusual opportunity is to ensure that no single innocent candidate is punished unjustly.

These 67 candidates are, therefore, urged to print their supplementary examination notification slips from Monday, 19th September, 2022, to know the centres where they would be sitting the examination.

ONLINE PROGRAMMES: GALILEE IMI, ISRAEL, JAMB, NUC, NBTE COLLABORATE

s part of its avowed commitment to the provision of quality and accessible education, Galilee International Management Institute (Israel) is set to introduce online programmes in the nation's educational landscape.

Already, there is a high-level tripartite meeting scheduled to hold among the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and GIMI on the modalities, take-off and operations of the proposed programmes.

The Rector, Galilee International Management Institute (GIMI), Dr. Joseph Shevel, dropped this hint during a courtesy visit to the JAMB Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, on Monday, 12th September, 2022, in his office.

Dr. Shevel pointed out GIMI was established in 1987 and has acquired global reputation as a leading management institute providing accessible education as well as enhancing human connection and cooperation towards the provision of critical knowhow.

According to him, GIMI is fashioned to

create sustainable development and social change with a view to empowering people to enable them create positive change in their communities by encouraging them to think differently, take risks and nurture leaders.

Dr. Shevel, who was accompanied on the visit by an alumnus of the institute and former Vice-Chancellor, National Open University of Nigeria(NOUN), said GIMI planned to introduce three-year online programmes ranging from B.Sc. Civil Engineering, B.Sc. Education, to Digital Agricultural Science, among others, adding that the institute was partnering with over 220 universities spread across the Mediterranean region in that regard. In his remarks, the Registrar commended the Rector for the visit and lauded the conceptualisation of the idea of online programmes in these highly-competitive fields. He stated that the Board had the unique and distinctive mandate of placing suitably-qualified candidates into all strata of tertiary institutions, a power which it exercises in conjunction with these tertiary institutions.

The Registrar, however, disclosed that the instrument establishing the Board does not provide for facilitation of outward

movement of candidates to other countries rather, the law provides only for admittance of candidates into the nation's tertiary institutions.

He expressed reservations with respect to the proposed three-year online duration for civil engineering programmes as well as the proposal to make engineering courses to be totally online would not be acceptable to Nigerians and is against the regulations of the Council for the Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria(COREN) in addition to other extant conventions.

He said the proposal required the collaborative efforts of the nation's regulatory agencies with GIMI with a view to fashioning practicable and acceptable approaches to its implementation in line with international best global practices.

He urged the institute to come up with a well-articulated plan that would be fully dissected at the proposed tripartite meeting of NUC, NBTE and JAMB for the take-off of acceptable online programmes that would meet the nation's developmental aspirations.

ABIA STATE COORDINATOR HOLDS TRAINING WORKSHOP FOR HEADS OF UNIT

call has gone to all Heads of Units of the Abia State Office, Umuahia, to imbibe critical analytical skills needed for the analysis of the Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) recently rolled out by the State Office for its operational needs.

This was contained in an address delivered by the the Abia State Coordinator, Mr. Johnson Adebiyi, during a training workshop organised for all Heads of Units of the State Office.

According to the State Coordinator, these analytical skills involved reporting, forecasting, organisation, communication, problem-solving, data interpretation and metrics, among others, and are all geared towards enabling the State Office to get a good grasp of its official responsibilities.

The training modules exposed participants to skills related to collating, analysing and quantifying the performance of their Units towards the facilitation of the proposed KPIs Dashboard for the State Office.

The training also afforded participants the opportunity to be schooled on measurement scales, the use of percentile and graphical representations, which were aimed at equipping the participants with necessary skills to carry out analyses involving KPIs.

He explained that KPIs, as pertained to the State Office, were designed to evaluate the performance of its various Units, namely: SERVICOM, Professional Registration Centre (PRC), Public Relations and Accounts.

He stressed further that the essence of the

analysis process of KPIs was to create healthy rivalry among the Unit Heads, encourage teamwork as well as enable the State Office address any identified area of need

At the end of the training, the Unit Heads thanked the State Coordinator for organising the workshop and promised to deploy what they have learnt in their various areas of responsibilities.

DAILY TRUST NEWSPAPER TUESDAY 13TH SEPTEMBER, 2022 - No Biometric, No Mop-Up UTME — JAMB Insists: The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) says it will no longer conduct mop-up examinations for candidates who are not biometrically verified. The examination Board stated this in its Weekly Bulletin. It said the move was to further strengthen the noose around examination malpractice.

"It will be recalled that the Board, out of magnanimity allowed such candidates to be rescheduled for the supplementary UTME in 2017, however, the Board as of late, realized the futility of such an arrangement after assessing the process and its impact on the entire examination value chain."

To cater for the few that may have genuine cases of biometric issues, the Board had concluded arrangements for them to subsequently indicate such pitfall at the point of registration and they would be assigned to a centre situated within the National Headquarters of the Board for close monitoring,

The Board insisted that the measure was not only to sanitize the examination process but also to ensure that its hard-earned reputation was not impugned. Graduate New Doctors As ASUU Strike Lingers — Osibogun: President of the National Postgraduate Medical College of Nigeria, NPMCN, Prof. Akin Osibogun, has warned that Nigeria may not produce new doctors in 2022 as a result of the prolonged strike by the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU).

Warning of the consequences of such development, Osibogun, who spoke to journalists in Lagos, stated that the issues leading to the shortage of doctors in Nigeria year-in and -out must be addressed holistically for the benefit of Nigerians and the healthcare system.

"Nigeria can no longer fold its arms and allow the trend to continue," he said. "The prolonged strike by the ASUU makes it unlikely for Nigeria to graduate any doctor this year and there may not be House Officers next year, meaning there won't be medical youth corps members in 2024 and there won't be any doctor to enroll in our Residency Programme

The body also advised state governments to exercise restraint in establishing new institutions but to invest heavily in existing ones for quality infrastructure. The committee made the call in a communiqué signed by the secretary, Marcus Awobifa, issued at the end of its 57th quarterly meeting in Abuja, where it reviewed the state of the nation,

particularly the ongoing Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) indefinite strike.

COPSUN equally urged the political class to pay more attention to education via improved budgetary allocations.

The provost of the College, Dr Samuel Akintunde, when asked to comment on the development on Wednesday last week said that on December 23, 2001, the President assented to that bill and February this year, the gazetting was done and implementation is being awaited.

FEW FACTS ABOUT JAMB

- The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) was established for the general control of the conduct of matriculation examinations for admissions into all universities, polytechnics, monotechnics, colleges of education and (recently added) Innovation Enterprise Institutes (IEIs).
- Section 5 (2)of the ACT establishing the Board provided as stated: For the avoidance of doubt, the Board shall be responsible for determining matriculation requirements and conducting examinations leading to undergraduate admissions and also for admissions to National Diploma and the Nigerian Certificate in Education courses, but shall not be responsible for examinations or any other selective process for postgraduate courses and any other courses offered by the tertiary institutions. In the implementation of this section, there is always a synergy with the National Universities Commission(NUC), the National Board for Technical Education(NBTE) and the National Commission for Colleges of Education(NCCE) with the endorsement of the National Council on Education(NCCE).
- In exercising this power, the Board is always guided by admission guidelines approved by the Policy Meeting under the Chairmanship of the Hon. Minister of Education with all Heads of Tertiary Institutions and other stakeholders in attendance.
- Since the inception of the Interim Joint Matriculation Board Examination (IJMBE), JAMB appoints moderators for all its questions as well as the grading of candidates scores. It has always done this without failing to still accommodate 'HSC' within the current 6-3-3-4 system. The National Council on Education(NCE) guidelines for the Joint Universities Preliminary Examinations Board (JUPEB) also endorsed the practice for JUPEB.
- The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board shall continue to operate within its laws.

ADVISORY ON EXTENDING THE SCOPE OF SERVICE FOR CBT CENTRES

Following persistent requests from CBT centres, the Board has approved that some services hitherto, restricted to JAMB Offices, be extended to other approved CBT centres.

- 2. These services being extended to the CBT centres are registrations for:
 - (i) Part-time
 - (ii) NOUN
 - (iii) Sandwich
 - (iv) Distance Learning
- 3. The following steps are to be followed by each centre while attending to these category of candidates:
 - a. First create a Profile for the candidate (note that profile creation is free);
 - b. Login to the Candidate's Profile on e-Facility;
 - c. Expand the "Other Registrations" Tab and select the appropriate registration for the candidate;
 - d. Follow the prompts to make the payment of N3,500 application fees online using the candidate's ATM card (do not collect any candidate's card details, let the candidate be the one to enter his/her card details);
 - e. After payment, the centre will proceed to register the candidate on the Registration App platform and print out the Registration Slip.
 - f. For DE candidates of 2017 onwards, after registration, only the Registration Slip is to be given to them as the candidate's registration information goes straight to CAPS;
 - g. For candidates of year 2016 and before, after registration, the centre is expected to give them both the Registration Slip and an Indemnity Form;
 - h. The service charge for this type of registration is N700 only and payable directly to the centre.
- 4. Do not write down or copy any vital data of the candidates such as card details, profile code, password etc.
- 5. Recall that like the UTME/DE, the template is to be uploaded while candidates are to go away with the original (hard copy) template.
- 6. CBT centres shall abide by the rules as severe sanctions would be meted out to infractors.

ADVISORY TO INSTITUTIONS ON HOW TO HANDLE THE CONDONEMENT OF UNDISCLOSED ILLEGAL INSTITUTIONAL ADMISSIONS (CUIIA)

(ADMISSIONS CONDUCTED OUTSIDE CAPS 2017-2020)

The Board introduced the **Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS)** in 2017 as the transparent platform for all admissions. Regrettably, some of the institutions continued to admit some, indeed large number of candidates (undisclosed to JAMB), thereby jeopardizing the interest of such candidates admitted through under-the table deals.

Recent events made the candidates protest the disadvantages of such non-disclosure and lack of formal recognition of their degrees. Such Institutions are now being compelled by necessity to confess their past deeds of undisclosed admission.

This Advisory is to guide the affected institutions on how the candidates can be rescued:

- I. The institutions should first and foremost declare the number of candidates admitted outside CAPS by sending a formal letter of confession and disclosure (LCD) to the Registrar of JAMB.
- ii. The letter of confession and disclosure shou<mark>ld have</mark> the list of candidates attached. A copy of the letter and the list of candidates should be sent to JAMB state office where the institution is located. The list and total number of affected candidates for each year of admission should be clearly specified with the Programme (i.e Course of Study).
- iii. If the Board upon receiving the letter (and after due scrutiny and investigations) grants approval, the institution shall be contacted within 2 weeks of acknowledged receipt of the LCD.
- iv. The portal is then opened for the Institution to upload the list of candidates already submitted.
- v. The letter of approval from JAMB to the institution and the uploaded list shall contain the following:
 - the academic year for which the retroactive approval is granted;
 - total number of candidates, and
 - the period of grace (not exceeding 60 days) within which the affected candidates must complete the process of Condonement of Undisclosed Illegal Institutional Admission (CUIIA). Only the candidates declared by the institutions are to visit JAMB office and complete the appropriate form online after paying the prescribed fee (i.e) the application fee of N4,000 only is paid by those without JAMB Registration number for the year and N5,000 penalty paid by every candidate involved.
- vi. The records of the candidates shall then be made available on CAPS after they have completed the online process.
- vii. The Admission Officer of the Institution shall retroactively propose formally the candidates to the Head of Institution who in turn shall recommend the candidates within the specified time.
- viii. The JAMB Desk officer too, shall retroactively approve the candidates on CAPS within the original list submitted by the institution. After approval, the previously illegal students will be able to print their JAMB admission letters from e-facility on JAMB Portal.
- ix. It should be noted that the admission letter would henceforth carry the date of the retroactive approval and not backdated to protect the Board's integrity of the data it might have provided before the condonement. The admission letter would also be named "Retroactive Letter of Admission" to reflect the correct history of the admission.
- x. Please **NOTE** that only candidates on the list declared by the institutions shall be attended to at the JAMB office. The Board shall not extend the period of grace granted to each institution. Any candidate that does not complete the process within the allotted (maximum two months) grace period loses the remedial opportunity.

CESSATION OF ILLEGAL/IRREGULAR ADMISSIONS

- All applications of admissions to First Degree, National Diploma, National Innovation Diploma and the Nigeria Certificate in Education into Full-Time, Distance Learning, Part-Time, Outreach, Sandwich, etc., must be processed ONLY through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
- No Institution should advertise or sell "application forms" for admissions into the programmes. Institutions should advertise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
- Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and the three (3) Regulatory Agencies (National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) will ensure that all Tertiary Institutions comply with this policy directive. Other Professional Regulatory Agencies will also play a role in sanitizing the process.
- The duration of all Non-Full Time Studies must be maintained as approved by the Regulatory Agencies. This is generally not less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the equivalence of Full Time.

ADVERTORIALS

- Institutions that desire to place advertisement can do so with the requirement that candidates who sat for the current **UTME** (or **DE** candidates) should change to their institutions as First (1st) Choice rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application form or apply. This is to prevent the issue of double registration which is a violation of the mandate of JAMB.
- It should be reiterated that no Institution should advertise or sell "application forms" for admissions into the programmes listed above. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
