



PUNCH NEWSPAPER SATURDAY MAY 13TH, 2023 – 313 Illegal Varsities, Polys Uncovered In Eight Years: No fewer than 313 illegal universities, polytechnics, monotechnics and colleges of education were discovered between 2015 and April 2023, analysis by Saturday PUNCH has revealed.

The Punch correspondent, who conducted a tally from May 2019 to April 2023 observed that while some of these illegal tertiary institutions were uncovered by state ministries of education, others were discovered by sting operations conducted by regulatory bodies such as the National Universities Commission, National Board for Technical Education and the National Commission for Colleges of Education.

Professor Rasheed stated this at the public presentation of Core Curriculum Minimum Academic Standards (CCMAS) Book 1 series for Nigerian universities and a book in honour of Adamu Adamu Tuesday in Abuja.

Professor Rasheed said, "As at yesterday morning, there were 111 private universities in the country, as of yesterday evening, the number had risen to 148, 87 or 60 percent of it came during Adamu Adamu as Minister of Education," the NUC executive said.

Rasheed, who also described CCMAS as a game changer in Nigerian universities, commended former NUC Executive Secretary, Professor Peter Okebukola, for his role in its development, describing him as chief architect of the curriculum.

the people of the north for the current education backwardness being witnessed in the northern region of the country.

Adamu spoke on Tuesday in Abuja at the public presentation of the Core Curriculum Minimum Academic Standards (CCMAS) Book 1 series for Nigerian universities and a book in his honour.

The Minister speaking against the backdrop of reports that the north has the highest number of out-of-school children in Nigeria, with girls forming the larger number of out-of-school children from the region, said it was not correct to use Islam to keep women at home.

While commending the National Universities Commission (NUC) for ensuring the springing up of more private universities in Nigeria, Adamu said the Commission's effort is paying off with the establishment of more such institutions in Northern Nigeria in recent times.

He said: "The North is in selfimposed educational backwardness because the interest of the North is Islam, and Islam is the greatest promulgator of knowledge."

The Minister, however, expressed delight that out of the 37 new private universities approved by the Federal Executive Council on Monday, large number of them are situated in the North.

JAMB's spokesman, Dr. Fabian Benjamin, said in a statement that the remittance was in furtherance of the pledge by the Registrar, Prof. Ishaq Oloyede-led management, on an assumption of duty, that it would leverage technology and discipline to manage the affairs of the Board.

The PUNCH reports that since assuming office, the Oloyede-led management had remitted over N55bn to the Federal Government coffers.

"On assumption of office of the current Registrar, he had come up with a policy which holds that whatever would be done, must be on the table. This has changed the narratives such that JAMB now posts

humongous returns to the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

"These returns were bolstered by the Board's expanded internal capacities for its operations achieved through direct execution of its processes and procedures, which instantly resulted in, for instance, a savings of N1.2bn being paid annually to a service provider and a downward review of the N1.2bn being annually paid to another to about N400m with the same old service provider. This is in addition to the recovery of over N1.2bn in both cash and estates in choice areas of Abuja, in 2016.

t was commendation galore as the Hon. Minister of Education, Malam Adamu Adamu, received praises for the various landmark achievements recorded under his watch, particularly in the area of development of the nation's universities and the education sectoringeneral.

The series of commendation was part of the highlights of the public presentation of a book titled: "Repositioning the Nigerian Education System. The Ministerial Footprints of Adamu Adamu" edited by the erudite scholar, Prof. Peter Okebukola. According to Prof. Okebukola. According to Prof. Okebukola, the book is a collection of the indelible footprints, uncommon achievements and inroads that the Hon. Proceeding from the book launch and CCMAS presentation, was a capacity-building training programme for the implementation of CCMAS.

The programme was rounded off with fitting tributes to the Late Prof. Idris Abdulkadir and the Late Prof. Nimi Briggs. Dignitaries on the occasion included a former Minister of Education, Prof. Ruqqayattu Rufa'i, former Executive Secretary, NUC, Prof. Julius Okojie, academia, and other distinguished personalities.

social media publication being bandied around that one Atung Gerald with a score of 380 is the highest scorer in the 2023 UTME. Nothing, the Board noted, could be further from the truth.

The Board also expressed dismay at the level in which poorly-researched and very sensitive issues are being circulated in the public space even by people who should know better.

For instance, a careful study of the so-called UTME registration number of the said candidate would have shown that the people or groups pushing this fake narrative are patent carriers of fake news as the registration number could readily be seen that it is a non existence registration number given its false features.

In view of the foregoing, the Board urges all to always cross-check their facts before going public as a particular supposedly 'hot' news item might turn to be a red herring.


The Board also noted that the socalled reward expected to be handed over to the owner of the phantom score is nothing but a figment of the fecund imagination of the writer as it had never for any reason directly rewarded or recognized any highest-scoring or lowest-scoring candidate.

This is, however, not to say that, the Board, in the course of conversations at some strategic events, has not had cause, at times, to release its ten highest UTME scorers to buttress some salient points especially when issues of what constitutes highest scores which included candidates O'level and institution's screening scores are explained. Such had never been about directly honouring or rewarding such candidates.

It would be recalled that a decade ago, Cowbell had instituted an award for the highest scorers, as noble as that policy was, it was, to all intents and purposes, a private sector initiative.

Therefore, the Board finds it rather unfortunate for some obscure writers to bring up random names of people from certain parts of the country just to create negative impressions in the minds of those who might not know. As such, to set the records straight, the Board disclosed that it had, no record of any candidate who scored 380.

The Board, as a responsive agency, will continue to be guided by the spirit of patriotism as it consciously takes those steps aimed at upholding national ethics and values while implementing those policies aimed at checking abuses and protecting the rights of Nigerians. Hence, the Board will continue to strive to give the nation its best and would not be deterred by those who do not wish her well.



...Effective and Prudent Management of Resources Responsible for Over N55b Remittance - JAMB

Oloyede-led management has remitted over N55billion to the Federal Government coffers. This is far above the less than the N60million remitted by the Board in the 38 years of the existence of the Board prior to the appointment of Prof. Oloyede.

On assumption of office of the current Registrar, he had come up with a policy which holds that whatever would be done, must be on the table. This has changed the narratives such that JAMB now posts humongous returns to the Consolidated Revenue Fund (CRF). These returns were bolstered by the Board's expanded internal capacities for its operations achieved through direct execution of its processes and procedures, which instantly resulted in, for instance, a savings of N1.2billion being paid annually to a service provider and a downward review of the N1.2billion being annually paid to another to about N400million with the same old service provider. This in addition to the recovery of over N1.2billion in both cash and estates in choice areas of Abuja, in 2016.

It was these steps and many others,

which had ensured that a Board, which had remitted cumulatively in its 40 years of existence about N55 million to the national treasury, rendered N7.8billion in the first year of the assumption of office of Prof. Oloyede and has since contributed over N27billion directly into the national treasury. The remitted amount is without prejudice to the 30% reduction in its application fee (N10.8billion in 4 years since the reduction), Capital Fund (N11billion including N6billion, which is yet to be committed), Annual Awards/Grants to Tertiary Institutions for Capital Projects (N1billion) and Special Staff Welfare Scheme (N2billion). This would aggregate the cumulative surplus to about N54billion over the last six years.

In another development, the Board has expressed its commitment to press ahead with its efforts to reposition the conduct of public examinations in Nigeria. In a statement issued at the end of its management committee meeting held to appraise the recent crisis witnessed in the conduct of the 2023 Direct Entry registration, the Board stated that the seeming crisis was birthed by the implementation of

some of its newly-adopted processes aimed at curbing infractions in the admission value chain given our national peculiarities.

Another major policy change also to be implemented by the Board to holistically address all loopholes giving rise to abuses in the Direct Entry admission processes is that all DE candidates, which comprise those seeking to be in Year Two in the universities, would henceforth be required to sit the Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination UTME along with other candidates for them to justify the possession of their A'level certificates.

This policy is to be situated within the ambit of the Board's relentless efforts aimed at enhancing the growth of the nation's education sector as it would promote transparency, accountability and good governance. It also underscores the Board's commitment and determination towards changing the negative narrative of A'level admissions into higher institutions in Nigeria.

JIGAWA STATE COORDINATOR CHARGES FRESHERS OF KHADIJA UNIVERSITY ON DECORUM

he Jigawa State Coordinator of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Mr. Bello Aminu, has charged the fresh intakes of the Khadija University, Majia, to maintain decorumonthe campus.

Mr. Aminu gave the charge in an interaction with JAMBulletin at the sidelines of the matriculation ceremony for the 2022/2023 Academic Session held on 13th May, 2023.

In his remarks, the State Coordinator underscored the importance of morality to national development.

He said, "Only if everyone will keep morality to mind, will Nigeria be a better place for all."

"I charge the matriculants to maintain decorum on the campushooliganism, cultism, and malpractices, under whatever guise, are unwholesome to your growth and development, they should be eschewed."

Earlier in his matriculation speech, the Vice-Chancellor of the University, Prof. Umar Muhammad Sani, disclosed that the institution is the third university in the State but is the only first private university in Jigawa State, adding that the institution is noted for its academic standard and excellence.

According to Prof. Sani, a total number of 260 students constituting 59.6% males and 40.4% females were matriculated while congratulating the freshers on their first academic ceremony.

Continuing, the Vice-Chancellor admonished the students to avail themselves of the state-of-the-art learning facilities in the institution for an all-round learning experience.



FEW FACTS ABOUT JAMB

- The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) was established for the general control of the conduct of matriculation examinations for admissions into all universities, polytechnics, monotechnics, colleges of education and (recently added) Innovation Enterprise Institutes (IEIs).
- Section 5 (2)of the ACT establishing the Board provided as stated: For the avoidance of doubt, the Board shall be responsible for determining matriculation requirements and conducting examinations leading to undergraduate admissions and also for admissions to National Diploma and the Nigerian Certificate in Education courses, but shall not be responsible for examinations or any other selective process for postgraduate courses and any other courses offered by the tertiary institutions. In the implementation of this section, there is always a synergy with the National Universities Commission(NUC), the National Board for Technical Education(NBTE) and the National Commission for Colleges of Education(NCCE) with the endorsement of the National Council on Education(NCCE).
- In exercising this power, the Board is always guided by admission guidelines approved by the Policy Meeting under the Chairmanship of the Hon. Minister of Education with all Heads of Tertiary Institutions and other stakeholders in attendance.
- Since the inception of the Interim Joint Matriculation Board Examination (IJMBE), JAMB appoints moderators for all its questions as well as the grading of candidates scores. It has always done this without failing to still accommodate 'HSC' within the current 6-3-3-4 system. The National Council on Education(NCE) guidelines for the Joint Universities Preliminary Examinations Board (JUPEB) also endorsed the practice for JUPEB.
- The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board shall continue to operate within its laws.

RESUMPTION OF DIRECT ENTRY EXERCISE

You will recall that the Board commenced the 2023 Direct Entry registration on Monday, 20^{th} February, 2023, but had to immediately suspend it following the discovery of the plethora of devices and machinations to circumvent and compromise the standard of A 'level qualifications required from DE candidates. Recall that recent joint operations of the Federal Ministry of Education and the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC) on DE qualifications brought to light some of these unsavoury and nefarious activities. Bayero University, Kano (BUK) has also consistently brought to the fore the high rate of forgery of A'Level qualifications for DE.

- 2. For instance, it was discovered that, in previous years, some candidates used unacceptable and forged A' level certificates/qualifications to register for Direct Entry and eventually got admitted. For example out 148 candidates verified by BUK, only 6 were found to be genuine. By implication 142 of the results were forged. The Board, concerned stakeholders and institutions are working assiduously to detect such and the ones already found, are being dealt with according to the provisions of the law.
- 3. In order to further checkmate the anomaly and to also prevent recurrence of such irregularity, the Board has decided that the 2023 DE registrations will not only be restricted to JAMB PTCs but will also be done under strict supervision.
- 4. The Board has provided additional guidelines to all DE registration outlets (JAMB-owned centres), Officers of the Board and candidates on the 2023 Direct Entry registration exercise: -

- i. At the point of registration, all candidates must fill in:
 - a) Registration/Matriculation Number of the previous school attended where the qualification was obtained;
 - b) Subject(s) of qualification;
 - c) Awarding Institution;
 - d) Institution actually attended.
- ii. The Board will only recognise and accept thirteen (13) qualifications/certificates for the 2023 Direct Entry registration exercise as highlighted in the table below:-

INNOVATIONS IN THE UTME AND A CALL FOR UNDERSTANDING

It will be recalled that the Board has gradually upgraded its operational processes since 2017, and as is usual with change, it came with some challenges including resistance. Given public support and understanding, the Board since 2018 has reached the cruising level. However, there is always room for improvement and the Board has decided to move to the next stage of its technological transformation.

The next stage requires all hands to be on deck as we take some crucial steps. The Board has instituted some measures which are to be deployed during the 2023 UTME exercise. Despite the fact that the innovations have been tested and certified, yet it is not unlikely that some hiccups might spring up when the new technology is deployed live and nationwide. We therefore solicit your support and understanding as we promptly address any unforeseen circumstances. Hardly can there be growth without audacity and courage.

One major feature of the new dispensation is that no examination would be allowed to take place after one hour of its scheduled start time because the Board has discovered that some of the problems reported at the centres are contrived to delay the commencement of a session in some centres with a view to securing undue advantage for the delayed candidates.

Consequently, any session that, for whatever reason(s), could not take-off within one hour of its schedule is automatically rescheduled. When such occurs, affected candidates are expected to file out of the examination hall into the waiting hall and await the new scheduled time and place which most

likely would be the same or following day. Candidates are expected not to disrupt subsequent sessions but to simply await information on reschedule. Parents have constituted major intrusion into the examination process. While we appeal for parents to keep-off the examination venues, we would not hesitate to sanction the candidates and (parents) whose parents obstruct the smooth running of the centre.

The rescheduling does not permit a candidate who was initially marked absent during the screening to be part of the rescheduled session since the questions meant for such absentees have been withdrawn and not available for the rescheduled session.

In addressing possible rescheduling, an extra session has been created for every centre on every examination day.

CESSATION OF ILLEGAL/IRREGULAR ADMISSIONS

- All applications of admissions to First Degree, National Diploma, National Innovation Diploma and the Nigeria Certificate in Education into Full-Time, Distance Learning, Part-Time, Outreach, Sandwich, etc., must be processed ONLY through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
- No Institution should advertise or sell "application forms" for admissions into the programmes. Institutions should advertise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
- Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and the three (3) Regulatory Agencies (National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) will ensure that all Tertiary Institutions comply with this policy directive. Other Professional Regulatory Agencies will also play a role in sanitizing the process.
- The duration of all Non-Full Time Studies must be maintained as approved by the Regulatory Agencies. This is generally not less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the equivalence of Full Time.

ADVERTORIALS

- Institutions that desire to place advertisement can do so with the requirement that candidates who sat for the current **UTME** (or **DE** candidates) should change to their institutions as First (1st) Choice rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application form or apply. This is to prevent the issue of double registration which is a violation of the mandate of JAMB.
- It should be reiterated that no Institution should advertise or sell "application forms" for admissions into the programmes listed above. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
