### JAMB ADOPTS OPTIONAL USSD CODE

s part of the intensive preparations for a hitch-free 2022 UTME/DE registration exercise, the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) is putting finishing touches to all arrangements for the institution of an additional USSD code to be used by candidates besides the 55019 code that had been in operation since 2018 for registration and other essential services offered by the Board.

The 55019 code is used to create profiles for registration by candidates who are required to send their National Identification Number (NIN) via the code for their details to be pulled from the NIMC database before proceeding to a certified Contd in Pg 5

## GNISED FOR ADMIS

he National Technical Certificate(NTC), the Advanced National Technical Certificate(ANTC), the National Busines Certificate (NBC), the Advanced National Business Certificate (ANBC) and the Modular Trade Certificate( MTC) issued by the National Business and Technical Examinations Board (NABTEB) are valid, recognised and acceptable for the purpose of admission by JAMB as prescribed by law.

However, what is not recognised, approved or known to law is the NABTEB Advanced General Certificate in Education (NAGCE).

## JAMB CSR IMPACTFUL, WORTHY OF EMULATION - DR ONIRETI

#### ...As JAMB Takes University Dons on Sabbatical

he Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) model of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB)has been described as appropriate, impactful and worthy of emulation.

A former Head of Arabic Department, University of Ilorin, Dr Lateef Onireti Ibraheem, made these submissions in a presentation titled: "An Assessment of JAMB Corporate Social Responsibility: Outreach Education and Environmental Initiative" held on Wednesday, 26th January 2022, at the Board's Auditorium, Bwari, Abuja.

Dr Onireti is currently on sabbatical with JAMB following the approval of its 10th Governing Board to accommodate senior academics with relevant qualifications and experience to stimulate intellectual sagacity among its staff. Dons on sabbatical also have to engage in research work, present their findings to the entire staff of the Board and the research work must be one that could positively impact the staff and the Board's operations.

Dr Onireti, at the maiden edition of the presentation, shared his findings with the Management and staff of JAMB on the impact of the Board's intervention in some adopted schools in the Bwari Area Council, as an aspect of its Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR). This development has led to the deployment of some of its staff with backgrounds in education to teach in these schools.

Nomadic Primary School, Tudun Fulani, Government Secondary School, Guto-Bwari, and Government Secondary School, Bwari, for robust interventions in their areas of needs. As a result, no fewer than fifty of its staff with relevant educational qualifications were deployed to teach various subjects in these schools to complement the efforts of their existing staff

In addition to this, the Board's teaching staff were also mandated to organise guidance and counselling sessions, career modelling and mentoring of students for maximum impact. The Board had complemented these interventionist programmes with infrastructural upgrade in the adopted schools to facilitate a more befitting learning environment.

The university Don said, based on available reports, the Board's interventions in 2018, which had covered teaching and environmental uplift, led to significant improvements in the academic standing of the adopted schools.

Dr Onireti had also pointed out that the Board's interventions have sufficiently addressed not only the academic well-being of the students but also the infrastructural needs of the selected schools.

Dr Onireti submitted that the intervention of the Prof.

Oloyede-led Management had provided the opportunity for staff of the Board's Test Development Department to have the requisite classroom experience that had enhanced their test item generation skills. Furthermore, the intervention had also boosted the enrollment figures of the adopted schools, and by extension, helped to address the challenge of out-ofschool children in the FCT.

The presenter said, "A solid foundation for the development of academicallysound future leaders, who will advance the cause of nation-building, is being laid."

The erudite scholar called for the sustenance of the outreach initiative and urged the Board to extend the programme to other schools within Bwari Area Council.

In conclusion, the presenter recommended that gualified members of staff in the outstations should be deployed to teach in schools within their host communities to positively impact the educational system in their localities.

In the same vein, Dr Onireti urged the Management of the Board to revert to the initial recommendation of the committee on the adoption of school under the "JAMB-Bwari Community Relations Initiative" that the teaching intervention should be confined to only Senior Secondary Schools, particularly the classes which students are preparing for terminal examinations such as SSCE and UTME, while the social and environmental interventions should be reserved for Primary and Junior Secondary Schools.

He suggested the emplacement of effective monitoring mechanisms of teaching staff deployed to the adopted schools to achieve maximum results.

Citing the 2020 report on the state of university in Nigeria, Okebukola said the report urged professors of Computer Science to regularly upscale their digital skills.

Okebukola gave the advice recently while presenting a keynote paper at a webinar organised by the Nigeria Computer Society (NCS). According to him, teachers in the universities would need to improve their digital literacy skills.

In its timeline of events, the Board announced that the UTME/DE registration starts 12th February 2022 and ends 19th March 2022.

In another development, the Board said that it had rejected the apology of a "repentant" candidate who wrote to intimate the Board of examination malpractices which he committed 21 years ago.

The examination regulatory board added that the only way it would accept the apology was for the former candidate to forfeit all the certificates he had acquired with the result of his University Matriculation Examination (UME), now known as Unified Tertiary Matriculation( UTME). UBEC is also to build one of such schools in the 36 states. Each of them will cost N350 million. The schools which will have the capacity to accommodate a large number of students and ICT infrastructure will be known as UBEC Modern Smart Schools.

The groundbreaking for one of the schools was performed by UBEC's Executive Secretary, Dr Hamid Boboyi in Hadeja, Jigawa State, at the weekend. Dr Boboyi explained in a statement that the UBEC Smart School Programme was informed by the lockdown and closure of

schools for nearly one year as a result of COVID-19.

He added that the concept became necessary to prepare for situations that could disrupt the teaching and learning process in future.

NATION NEWSPAPER TUESDAY, 25TH JANUARY, 2022 – JAMB Rejects NABTEB A/Level AS Entry Requirement for Direct Entry: The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has rejected the National Business and Technical Examinations Board's (NABTEB's) Advanced Level as an entry requirement for Direct Entry (DE) into tertiary institutions.

The Board said the directive became necessary following the discovery that relevant government policies on A-Level programmes do not permit NABTEB from conducting Advanced Level examinations. A statement by its Director of Admissions, Mohammed Ahmed, which was made available to vice-chancellors and other heads of tertiary institutions in the country, said JAMB would not process the admission of any candidate with NABTEB A/L Certificate.

According to the statement, "JAMB is aware that NABTEB is not authorised to offer GCE and is, therefore, compelled to take appropriate action."

It added: "Any A/L GCE Certificate issued by NABTEB is, therefore, not registrable with JAMB and the board would not process the admission of any candidate with such a result."

Polytechnics Losing Focus in Manpower Development- TETFund: The Executive Secretary, Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETfund), Prof. Suleiman Bogoro, has said that for Nigerian polytechnics to thrive, they must focus on manpower development for teaching and practicals.

He said this recently at a two-day capacity building workshop for public polytechnics, on the theme: 'Improving Skills Development in Nigerian Polytechnics for Economic Growth, Entrepreneurship and Social Inclusion.'

He said: "Our polytechnics appear to be missing this very important requirement. Without these relevant teaching skills, our polytechnics can only turn out graduates with certificates but regrettably, without technical knowledge or skill. Prof. Bogoro said polytechnic lecturers must acquire relevant teaching skills to impart the required industry-tailored knowledge to students.

He also charged Nigerian polytechnics to give industrial training/attachment all the seriousness it deserves for any meaningful progress to be made on the delivery of their mandates.

The Executive Secretary, National Board for Technical Education, Prof. Idris Bugaje, who also spoke at the event, decried the low skills content in polytechnics, stating that at National Diploma and Higher National Diploma, the level of skills content is depreciating. How Computer-Based GCSE and A/Level Examinations Could Work: In this report by Education Correspondent, Will Hazell talks about how the COVID-19 pandemic has reinvigorated debates about whether General Certificate of Secondary Education (GCSE) and Advanced Level (A/Level) examinations should be done online and if the exercise would be successful. With the onslaught of the pandemic, especially with the effect it registered with examination results, it has called for scrutiny of the assessment system.

Quite a number of stakeholders who are vying for online testing point out that most people spend much of their working and social lives on device and as such public examinations should also have a digital element.

It is the belief that Computer-based examinations would allow "adaptive" tests, which tailor themselves to each student, getting harder or easier depending on how they answer questions. Computer-based examinations would get rid of the need for "tiered" exams, which currently mean that students enrolled for the "foundation" paper in certain subjects are limited in the top grade they can achieve.

## JAMB INTRODUCES COMPUTER STUDIES AND PHYSICAL AND HEALTH EDUCATION AS UTME SUBJECTS

andidates sitting the Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) can now pick Computer Studies or Physical and Health Education as part of their four UTME subjects if they so desire or as dictated by their programme preferences.

This is made possible following the addition, by the Joint Admissions and

Matriculation Board (JAMB), of the two subjects to the existing 23 UTME subjects to make them 25 beginning from the 2022 UTME exercise.

This addition is to enhance the career prospects of students transiting to tertiary institutions.At present, the 23 UTME subjects are :Agricultural Science, Arabic, Art, Biology, Chemistry, Christian Religious Studies, Commerce, Economics, French, Geography, Government, Hausa, History, Home Economics, Igbo, Islamic Studies, Literature-in-English, Mathematics, Music, Physics, Principles of Accounts, Use of English and Yoruba.

### ADVISORY TO INSTITUTIONS ON HOW TO HANDLE THE CONDONEMENT OF UNDISCLOSED ILLEGAL INSTITUTIONAL ADMISSIONS (CUIIA) (ADMISSIONS CONDUCTED OUTSIDE CAPS 2017-2020)

The Board introduced the **Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS)** in 2017 as the transparent platform for all admissions. Regrettably, some of the institutions continued to admit some, indeed large number of candidates (undisclosed to JAMB), thereby jeopardizing the interest of such candidates admitted through under-the table deals.

Recent events made the candidates protest the disadvantages of such non-disclosure and lack of formal recognition of their degrees. Such Institutions are now being compelled by necessity to confess their past deeds of undisclosed admission.

This Advisory is to guide the affected institutions on how the candidates can be rescued:

- I. The institutions should first and foremost declare the number of candidates admitted outside CAPS by sending a formal letter of confession and disclosure (LCD) to the Registrar of JAMB.
- ii. The letter of confession and disclosure should have the list of candidates attached. A copy of the letter and the list of candidates should be sent to JAMB state office where the institution is located. The list and total number of affected candidates for each year of admission should be clearly specified with the Programme (i.e Course of Study).
- iii. If the Board upon receiving the letter (and after due scrutiny and investigations) grants approval, the institution shall be contacted within 2 weeks of acknowledged receipt of the LCD.
- iv. The portal is then opened for the Institution to upload the list of candidates already submitted.
- v. The letter of approval from JAMB to the institution and the uploaded list shall contain the following:
  - the academic year for which the retroactive approval is granted;
  - total number of candidates, and

the period of grace (not exceeding 60 days) within which the affected candidates must complete the process of **Condonement of Undisclosed Illegal Institutional Admission (CUIIA).** Only the candidates declared by the institutions are to visit JAMB office and complete the appropriate form online after paying the prescribed fee (i.e) the application fee of N4,000 only is paid by those without JAMB Registration number for the year and N5,000 penalty paid by every candidate involved.

- vi. The records of the candidates shall then be made available on CAPS after they have completed the online process.
- vii. The Admission Officer of the Institution shall retroactively propose formally the candidates to the Head of Institution who in turn shall recommend the candidates within the specified time.
- viii. The JAMB Desk officer too, shall retroactively approve the candidates on CAPS within the original list submitted by the institution. After approval, the previously illegal students will be able to print their JAMB admission letters from e-facility on JAMB Portal.
- ix. It should be noted that the admission letter would henceforth carry the date of the retroactive approval and not backdated to protect the Board's integrity of the data it might have provided before the condonement. The admission letter would also be named **"Retroactive Letter of Admission"** to reflect the correct history of the admission.
- x. Please NOTE that only candidates on the list declared by the institutions shall be attended to at the JAMB office. The Board shall not extend the period of grace granted to each institution. Any candidate that does not complete the process within the allotted (maximum two months) grace period loses the remedial opportunity.
